Their first album together, "Rags to is tremendously popular, and they are highlighted as a duo and as soloists on "The Connection." Gershwin Catherine's talent as an accompanist shines on another release, "The Best of Ofra Harnoy."

Catherine is also the founder and leader of Trio Vivant, a piano, violin and 'cello ensemble with a repertoire that reflects Catherine's love of classical, ragtime and contemporary music. Trio Vivant has performed at festivals and concerts across Canada and the United States. Their debut disc "Palm Court Pleasures" has enjoyed brisk sales at record counters everywhere and has been chosen by the Columbia Record Club to join their roster of selected recor-
