Baseball registration may be capped

Herald Sports Editor Georgetown Baseball Association, faced with increasing registration numbers, is maintaining they must either cut back playing time for its house league teams or limit registration to 600 children next year.

Jean Aubin, president of the association, said the group's teams have reached their capacity of 15 players each and there is

no more room left on the baseball diamond schedule.

"With 15 guys per team, that means six will have to sit out every inning, which isn't much fun for them. I know there are other fields in town, but you just can't use the smaller diamonds for the older kids and we only have one regulation sized one."

Aubin said the GBA had been counting on a new community park in Georgetown South to help

handle the increased numbers, but were dismayed to see that nothing has happened in that area recently.

"Usually when you have development, when the streets are paved and the sidewalks are in like they are in there now, the parks are usually done as well, which is not the case here."

Bryan Shynall, superintendent of parks and cemeteries for the Town of Halton Hills Recreation

and Parks Department, said development of the fields is tied to the rate that Georgetown South is built, since the money required comes from lot levies, which has slowed down due to the present economy.


"Part of the problem is that nobody foresaw the slowdown. The parks could have been well on their way to being finished right now if things hadn't fallen

Shynall pointed out the GBA house leagues don't play any games on the weekends or Friday evenings, requiring the schedule to be squeezed into a four day week. He also said the GBA had been floundering a few years ago with poor numbers and there was no guarantee registration wouldn't drop off again in a few years.

Aubin acknowledged there are no games on weekends, but said that was to accommodate the parents so they would be able to. go to the cottage or get away elsewhere. He also predicted baseball registration would fall off if the children were required to play on weekdends, because many parents would prefer not to give that up.

"With our present schedule, registration has grown by 50 every year for at least the last three years that I've been with the GBA. If we have to cut back on the number of games, the long term scenario isn't pretty. House league is relative to how competitive your rep teams are and if we reduce their playing time, the quality of their play will suffer."

Tom Shepard, director of parks and recreation for the Town of Halton Hills, said when the town looks at its master plan within the next year or so, the numbers showing near capacity (seven days a week) for the fields will have to be there in order to justify the expense of building a regulation sized field. Money for such a project, if justified, hasn't been budgeted until 1994.

Baseball group needs volunteers

Georgetown Baseball Association, faced with the largest registration in its history, is in need of coaches, convenors and umpires to help its teams have another successful year.

Donna Blight, vice-presdient of the association's house league, said this year promises to be a challenging and exciting one for everyone involved, especially with the increase of the Bantam/Midget/Juvenile house league from three to five teams.

"We really need a convenor and more umpires, especially for this league. Last year saw this league operate without a convenor and again no volunteer has come forward to offer their help in this area."

Blight said there is an obvious interest among youths aged 14 and up in playing recreational baseball, but without the support of parents in helping this league to operate, those players are likely to be disappointed.

While most of the jobs are on a volunteer basis, the umpires are paid \$8 for each game behind the plate and \$6 for each one in the

field. The shortage last year for umpires was so severe at times that parents often had to be asked to be the second official; something the GBA wants to avoid this season.

Blight also said the need for volunteers to help with organizing the operation of the expanding association is also growing.

She said Dave Beavan, director of volunteers, would be happy to have any person interested in assisting to give him a call at 877-6425.

As a result of the increase in teams, Blight said more sponsors are also needed at both the rep and house league levels. Sponsors play an important role in the organization of baseball, helping to keep player fees as low as possible.

Blight said the cost of sponsoring a house league team is \$250 while a rep team is \$400. She assured that anyone helping out in this area would be given their due acknowledgement by making their support well known in the Georgetown area.
