Mischief charge

Halton Regional Police charged a Georgetown man with mischief after he flew into a rage and smashed a door at a Georgetown Variety Store Monday. Police say the man was denied a request to use the phone and got so angry, he slammed the store door, breaking the glass. Police say the man was hyper at the time of his arrest. The accused will appear in Milton Court May 6.

Left without paying

Police are looking for two suspects who pulled up at a gas station on Trafalgar Road in Georgetown and made off with \$12 worth of fuel Wednesday night. Police say the persons in the car, two black males, left without paying in a Volkswagen Rabbit, with no plates. Police are continuing to investigate the incident.

Car demolished

A 1989 Ford that was found demolished in a ditch on Trafalgar Road Wednesday afternoon was actually a stolen vehicle, say police. The car was reported stolen after the accident. The driver of the car left the scene and fled on foot. No charges have been laid.

Apartment entered

An unknown suspect stole a hunting knife and a 'Spellmaster' computer worth \$150 from a Raylawn Cres. apartment last Friday say police, who are continuing to investigate the incident.

Cars damaged

Police report that sometime over the weekend, unknown suspects threw two bricks at the rear window of a 1991 Toyota Tercel and 1991 Toyota Corolla parked at a Georgetown Auto Dealership. Police are continuing to investigate.

Police money missing

The Halton Regional Police Service is investigating the theft of cash from within the police service. Approximately two months ago, members of the Regional Criminal Investigation Division launched a probe into suspicions that money was believed to be missing during financial transactions carried on within the police service. The police are not revealing the amount of money involved at this time. Although the particular bureaus affected by the investigation are unspecified, cash is routinely accepted by various bureaus within the service in payment of committal warrants. At about the same time a routine audit of the service's cash-handling procedures was launched, and is continuing in conjunction with the investigation.

Lung Association sets up program

Province's dump analysis "appalling"

The province's Environmental Approval branch's analysis of the proposed Acton dump is "appalling," said Barbara Halsall, President of local environmental group Protect Our Water Environmental Resources, Wednesday. According to the report, of which the Herald obtained a copy Wednesday, the Acton quarry located south of Highway 25 could be converted into a dump after extensive engineering had been done on the site. A dump could be established that would minimize any impact the landfill would have on groundwater within the stan-

dards set by Ministry of Environment, explains the report. Ms. Halsall said, "Engineers think anything is possible but there are times when engineering can't solve all problems," - the conversion of the Acton quarry into a dump being one of them, she said. According to the report, engineering on the site must take place to ensure that leachate is prevented from escaping from the landfill and entering the water flowing under the dump. Leachate is a poisonous liquid formed when rain water percolates through waste in a dump. The report indicates that

without engineering work done on the site there would be significant accumulations of leachate in the water supply between the proposed landfill and the Niagara Escarpment on which the Acton quarry is located. As well, the contaminated groundwater would flow to Black Creek, a tributary of the Credit River. The end result being that no engineering work on the site would mean significant leachate contamination of Black Creek, the report indicates. Pointing to the fact that leachate has escaped from the Glenridge landfill site in St. Continued on Page 4

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
