Two of Georgetown District High School Rebels rugby teams got off to a positive start on Thursday, winning their first games of the 1991 season.

Seniors played at Acton High School, taking the match 17-0. Midgets were to host Assumption that same afternoon, but won by default because that school couldn't field a team. Junior team also visited Acton, but lost. A score of that game was unavailable at press time.

Jim Hall, head of the GDHS athletics department, said he was happy with the efforts all his wrestlers made this year. After a three-year absence, Rebel wrestling was resurrected and many Halton schools were taken by surprise.

The Rebels began by winning the Halton Junior Championships at Bishop Reding on March 28, placed third at the Halton Championships at GDHS on April 4 and qualified 10 athletes for Golden Horseshoe Athletic Conference Championships in Hamilton on April 11.

Most recently, the five students who advanced from GHAC to the Ontario Federation of School Athletic Associations (OFSAA) in Waterloo April 18-20 also placed well, according to Hall.

Although they didn't win any medals, Hall said the boys were in or about the top 12 placings (OFSAA only posts the top six finishers). Trevor Brent (185 lbs. class) won three matches, followed by Aaron Gooding (169 lbs.) with two wins, Bruce Ryan (97 lbs.) also won two, while Stew Teetzel (149 lbs.) won one and Steve Scarlett lost his two matches.

Track and Field coach Jay Anderson said poor weather conditions at the Bluevale Relays on Saturday didn't do much to help improve the team's ability to win.

The top finisher at the meet for Rebels was midget triple jumper Rob Weston, who placed third. Also placing third was the midget boys distance medley. The midget boys 4 x 100 relay placed fourth, as did the 4 x 800 open girls team. Kim Wiltshire placed fourth in the midget girls triple jump.

Other top finishers included the junior boys 4 x 100 team, which placed sixth and the senior boys-4 x 100 team that earned an eighth place finish. Scott Hobbs, who shattered Rebel and GDHS triple jump records at GDHS on April 16 with a distance of 13.35 metres and qualified for the Canadian Junior Championships in Winnipeg this summer, did just one jump and placed seventh.
