Teachers urge shop at home

The Ontario Teachers' Federation is urging its 126,000 members to consider the serious consequences of cross border shopping on the Ontario economy as well as on the province's education system. Ontario teachers are being asked to support their own economy by shopping at home.

The Federation's Board of Governors, which met in Toronto early in April, expressed grave concern about the effect of cross border shopping fever on small businesses, especially in Canadian border communities. "The number of small business closures is alarming and the unemployment ripple effect further escalates the cycle of consumer restraint," said Guill Archambault, OTF's president.

OTF is reminding its members that 'Ontario's economy and school system are inextricably linked, "Our schools, as well as our social and health care service, are supported by commercial, industrial and real property taxes. As businesses close, our taxes diminish and so, too, does education funding," said Archambault.

Margaret Wilson, secretarytreasurer of OTF, expressed the need to maintain and support our labor standards. "We pay more for chicken in Canada because we believe our chicken farmers deserve a decent living," she said. "Our market system, which allows Canadians to expect a decent day's pay for a decent day's work, does not exist in the U.S. If we value our own system, we must strive to protect it. We must recognize that cross border shopping is not just the benign escapade it used to be. It has become a hazard to our economy."

OTF is also seeking the cooperation of the Ontario Federation of Labor in asking its members to support our economy by shopping in Ontatrio. .

School News Catholic board slashes budget

Halton Roman Catholic School Board trustees are considering reductions totalling over \$2.4 million from the proposed \$96.7 million budget for 1991 which was presented at an April 23 meeting of the budget committee.

"We're required by law to file a blanced budget," said Halton Hill's French language trustee, Ken Norman who is also the vicechair of the budget committee. He explained that since the board submitted a deficit budget last year, the budget committee was mandated by the Ministry of Education to present a balance budget this year. The board will have to repay the deficit to the ministry within the next three years.

To balance the budget, the committee has recommended \$2.4 million worth of reductions from programs and education personnel. The recommendation was voted on Tuesday night.

"We're down to a bare bones budget," said Mr. Norman. "We're not looking at new programming. We're just maintaining the status quo."

The major effects of the proposed 1991 budget reductions are: - no summer students will be hired for 1991

temporary employees work-

ing in the maintenance and custodial area will be released by the end of the current school year

- maintenance and repair work will be reduced with only emergency repairs to be done

- no planned maintenance work for 1991 with all work to be deferred to 1992 or beyond

In the operational part of the budget, reductions for programming have amountged to \$343,200 of which \$32,700 was taken from field trips, \$54,000 taken from texts and resources and \$34,000 from staff development, the remaining reduction costs come from such items as capital, school concerts and temporary assistants, etc.

Other implications of the proposed reduction were outlined by the Director of Education, C. Byrnes at the meeting. He said split grades will be more common and there will be a more effective utilization of existing texts. As well, the board's three Enrichment Centres for the elementary level will be closed, he said, as there is a move to reorganize resources for gifted students.

This closure ha upset . some groups, said Mr. Norman. "We've had some groups suggest we limit the reductions to the budget but I think the approach taken by board staff has been the proper one."


