Budget breaks down education barriers

TORONTO - More workers are expected to gain access to the community college system under Ontario budget initiatives released Monday.

In the NDP's release of its first budget Monday, Treasurer Floyd Laughren announced plans to help workers wishing to upgrade their education. For example, work experience and prior learning will count towards college credits.

It will also be made easier to

transfer credits from one college to another when a person moves to a new city.

"It is time to break down unnecessary barriers between different educational institutions and between our educators and the workplace," Treasurer Floyd Laughren said in a speech to the Legislature.

"By building partnerships, in the context of long-term planning, we can begin to make this happen."

The government committed \$3 million in its 1991 budget towards the launch of the revisions.

The changes, based on a report

called Vision 2000, are designed, in part, to create universal standards for colleges. The government will create a College Standards and Accreditation Council to set the criteria.

Changes are expected to be in place within a few years.

The 1991 budget committed \$832 million in operating grants to colleges and \$1.95 billion for universities.

Meanwhile, the budget also committed \$152' million towards development. research and About \$81 million will go towards research in such areas as robotics, telecommunications and biotechnology.

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
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
