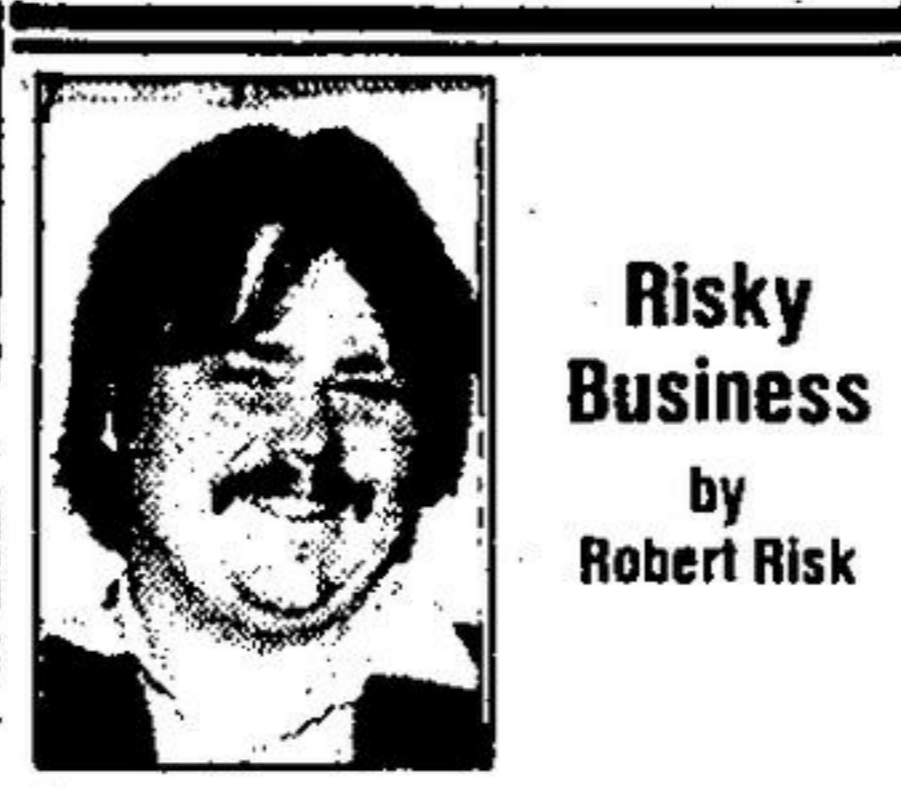
'B' is for basketball, the most noteworthy organization being the McCauley Ladies Basketball League, which completed its 18th season recently. Baseball is the

### Rolex Golf
