## Duignan sits on fence over police oath

North-Halton MPP Noel Duignan isn't about to jump on the bandwagon of Burlington Tory MPP Cam Jackson's campaign to have the provincial government reinstate the oath to the Queen in the Oath of Allegiance sworn by Ontario Police.

Mr. Jackson has started a province-wide petition ordering the government to respect the province's traditional association with the Queen.

Despite being unaware of the petition, Mr. Duignan said the issue doesn't affect him either way. He is just as happy to have a police officer take an oath of allegiance to Canada as he is for the officer to swear allegiance to the Queen.

Sitting on the fence, Mr. Duignan said he understands both positions. "I respect the British heritage the oath of allegiance to the Queen represents, but I also respect the opinion that swearing allegiance to Canada is the same as swearing allegiance to the Queen," he said.


Calls received at his constituency office in Milton on the oath issue slightly favor Ontario's police swearing an Oath to the Queen, said Mr. Duignan.

Surprisingly, Mr. Duignan said the change in the oath would never have happened had it caught the attention of cabinet before being approved. It just slipped through amongst a load of regulation changes being considered at the same time, ex-

plained the MPP.

Halton Regional Police spokesperson Sargeant Carey Smith said Thursday the position of Halton Police Chief James — Harding is he stands by the government's position believing an Oath change doesn't compromise loyalty to the monarch.

Chief Harding sat on the task force that recommended the Oath be changed. Chief Harding won't contradict the task force's recommendation because he was



Only last week, the governing body of the province's police service boards, reversed its decision of a year ago and now wants the New Democratic Government Party to reinstate the Oath of allegiance to the Queen.
