

# New business legislation proclaimed

All unincorporated businesses operating under names other than their owners' are now required to have their names registered. Ontario's new Business Names Act, 1989, proclaimed today includes companies in the previously-exempt service industry.

Past-laws regulating business names applied only to those in manufacturing, trade or mining. Businesses such as consultants, hairdressers and building contractors were not required to register. But under the new act, they must register their business names by November 30, 1991,

with the Companies Branch of the Ministry of Consumer and Commercial Relations (MCCR). The new act also applies to business names used by corporations.

"This new legislation will better protect consumers and businesses in Ontario," said Consumer and Commercial Relations Minister Marilyn Churley. "They will have easier access to information about businesses with which they deal. This type of information is particularly important to people trying to settle disputes."

Through registration, business names are placed in public files maintained by the Companies Branch.

The new legislation also provides for legal recourse in cases where damages are suffered as a result of deceptively similar business names. Registering does not in itself give someone exclusive use to a name. But registrants who feel they have suffered damages because someone else registered and used the same name or one that is much the same can take legal ac-

Companies with names already on record under the old legislation don't need to re-register until their five-year registration period has expired.












