Rebels aiming for playoffs

Aside from the Georgetown District High School Track and Field team, other Rebels competitors stayed in the thick of things as the Halton schools bear down for playoff qualification.

In soccer, the senior girls qualified for the quarter finals by placing fourth with a 3-3 record in the regular season. As the lowest division entrant, Georgetown visited top ranked Pearson (6-0) on Monday, but results were unavailable at press time.

If Georgetown advanced, they would play in the semi-finals today (Wednesday) at the highest survivor of the Volpe Division's quarter-final round.

Georgetown and Nelson senior rugby teams met head to head yesterday at Neilson Field in what is likely to be a preview of their opening playoff match-up on Thursday.

Since the fourth and fifth placed teams meet, the two teams, currently tied at six points each, battled it out to decide who would be the host for the post season game. Georgetown had the edge in scoring, so Nelson required a victory to claim fourth.

Junior rugby Rebels were 0-5 prior to their game at home to Bishop Reding on Tuesday, with both teams far out of playoff contention.

Midget rugby Rebels have yet to score a single point and are in fifth place with two points due to a default. As with the seniors, the midgets' last regular season game (vs. Bishop Reding yesterday) was a prelude to the opening of the playoffs, as Rebels visit Reding on Thursday.

In softball action, Georgetown (as of May 12) had a 1-3 record and was in a four way tie for third place. Since only the top four

teams advance, Rebels need a win today (Wednesday) against Notre Dame and on May 22 against Pearson, both at the Fairgrounds. Results from Monday's game at Nelson were unavailable at press time.

Again, due to time constraints, the results of the Georgetown T.A. Blakelock baseball game on Monday were unavailable. A reliable source said he was pretty sure the game was tied 0-0 in the fifth inning before the rains came down, but it was unclear if that match would be rescheduled.

At last count, Georgetown had a 3-1 record and were in third place with six points, behind Assumption and White Oaks.

Georgetown played Blakelock, who currently trail Georgetown by two points. Rebels hope to widen that gap when they play at Loyola (0-3) tomorrow (Thursday).

Delivery is anticipated by the Town in early June and distribution will commence on June 22nd, 1991. 4. The composter purchased with this order form will be used only at the address shown below. The composter is not intended for resale.
5. Only one composter will be provided per dwelling.
6. Residents who purchased a composter from the Town in 1990 are not eligible for another.
7. Purchasers agree to participate in follow-up studies which will be conducted to evaluate the success of the program.
