Jans wins junior squash title,

Georgetown resident Melanie Jans took the Girls Under-19 title at the Canadian Junior Squash Championships in Pickering, held May 9-12, making this her fourth national junior title.

Over 200 participants competed for eight titles in the four agegroup categories, with Jans winning hers with a 9-6, 9-5, 9-10, 9-2 win over Carole Ann Rodgers of Ottawa.

Jans was also awarded the Alexander Doucas Memorial Award, given annually to the junior player "best exemplifying the spirit of fair play, sportsmanship 'and commitment to excellence." Doucas lost his life in a boating accident two years ago at the age of 24. At the time, the Dorval, Quebec native was one of the

top ranked hardball squash players in the world.

Jans has also been appointed captain of the five-member national team which will be participating in the World Junior Girls Championships in Bergen, Norway from July 29 to August 10. In 1989, Jans was a member of the team which placed fifth.

Halton sports recruiter helps students connect

In a time of economic troubles for businesses, a Halton resident has found a product with unlimited resources and a high demand for his products. It's not gas or anything you'll find on the stock market - it's high school athletes.

Jim Giddens, who coaches football at M.M. Robinson High School, bought a recruiting franchise from Sports Recruits International in April and already has needed to hire eight people to help handle different areas of the business.

"It definitely grew incredibly fast after word of this got around. I started by doing information sessions at schools, talking to coaches and guidance councillors about the opportunities that are available. The demand alone for more seminars showed me things were going to be busy."

As a Sports Recruits International franchise owner, Giddens said he originally bought the rights to franchise the Halton Region, but due to the success, bought Hamilton-Wentworth's just this month.

Giddens said his company helps athletes looking to play sports while attending a university and helps market them to the various institutions in Canada and the United States.

"Before we started up, most athletes had to all the looking around themselves and try to convince the scouts to come see them. With access to over 1,600 schools and their scouting needs, we have an almost unlimited

market - about 170,000 scholarships are available in the U.S. and that's just for NCAA tier one or two."

Giddens said there are a lot of opportunities for students to find a scholarship. With 23 men's sports and 21 for women, being able to get in with the right one is almost entirely up to the player's abilities.

"That's one of the things we make clear to people. We charge \$449 for the use of the SRI service, but only if they are found to be marketable - and that money is a one time cost."

Giddens explained that anyone who approaches his group about signing up is checked out by an area representative (Andrew Nicholson is the contact in North Halton). That person talks to at least two of the student's ceaches and then, if recommended, must be checked out by Giddens himself, followed by approval from the SRI head office.

"One of the ways we've built a good reputation with the universities is by giving them profiles of people who don't have to be as fully checked out, saving the school time and money, while providing them with someone who they are likely to be interested in."

Giddens said anyone who doesn't meet the qualifications gets their money back. At the current time, he said there are between 50 and 100 Halton area students signed on with the service. Anyone wanting more information can call Giddens at (416) 336-7922.
