## Councillor wants provincial cash

· At the urging of Halton Regional Councillor Joe Hewitt, Regional Council directed staff Wednesday to request the province provide Halton with necessary funding to improve the Glen Williams water situation.

Coun. Hewitt was commenting on the province's recent decision not to give the Region \$1,476 million this year to extend the Glen Williams water main. The projected remains stalled without provincial funding.

Planning and Public Works Commissioner Art Leitch told councillors, staff will attempt to obtain provincial funding from sources other than the government's Direct grant program. It was under this program that Halton applied for the \$1.476 million for the Glen Williams Water main project that was subsequently turned down.

Coun. Hewitt is concerned that no extension for the Glen's watermain will jeopardize the community's water quality and quan-

tity.

Following Regional council, Coun. Hewitt said that out of the approximately 176 wells currently in the Glen, 70 per cent of the wells produce low water levels or low quality water. .

At the very least, that means people are unable to do their laundry or shower during certain times of the day, he said. At the very worst, it means some of the water in the Glen presents a health risk to those who drink it, the councillor predicted.

Coun. Hewitt suggested the province is wrong in not funding the Glen Williams water main extension project this year. He points to the fact the province doles out money for waterconnected projects designed to protect the environment or eliminate health hazards and these are supposedly of the highest priority.

Coun. Hewitt's comments come in the wake of similar comments he made the day before during a Halton Hills General Committee meeting. (General Committee is comprised of local Town and Regional councillors).

During Tuesday's General Committee meeting, the councillor said the Glen watermain must be extended to avoid the development of a serious water quality and quantity problem.

He requested Halton Hills. Town Mayor Russ Miller, write Ontario's Environment Minister Ruth Grier urging the minister to reconsider the decision so that funding be provided this year for the Glen watermain extension.

Coun. Hewitt expressed disappointment that North-Halton MPP Noel Duignan couldn't influence the province to fund the watermain project, especially since he made it one of his priorities when elected last September.

"Mr. Duignan has either been deserted by the Government or Mr. Duignan has deserted the Glen Williams residents," said Coun. Hewitt.

Mr. Duignan couldn't be reached for comment at press time.


