Chances are excellent that you will see "that" car, or one close enough to it. It will release a flood of memories.

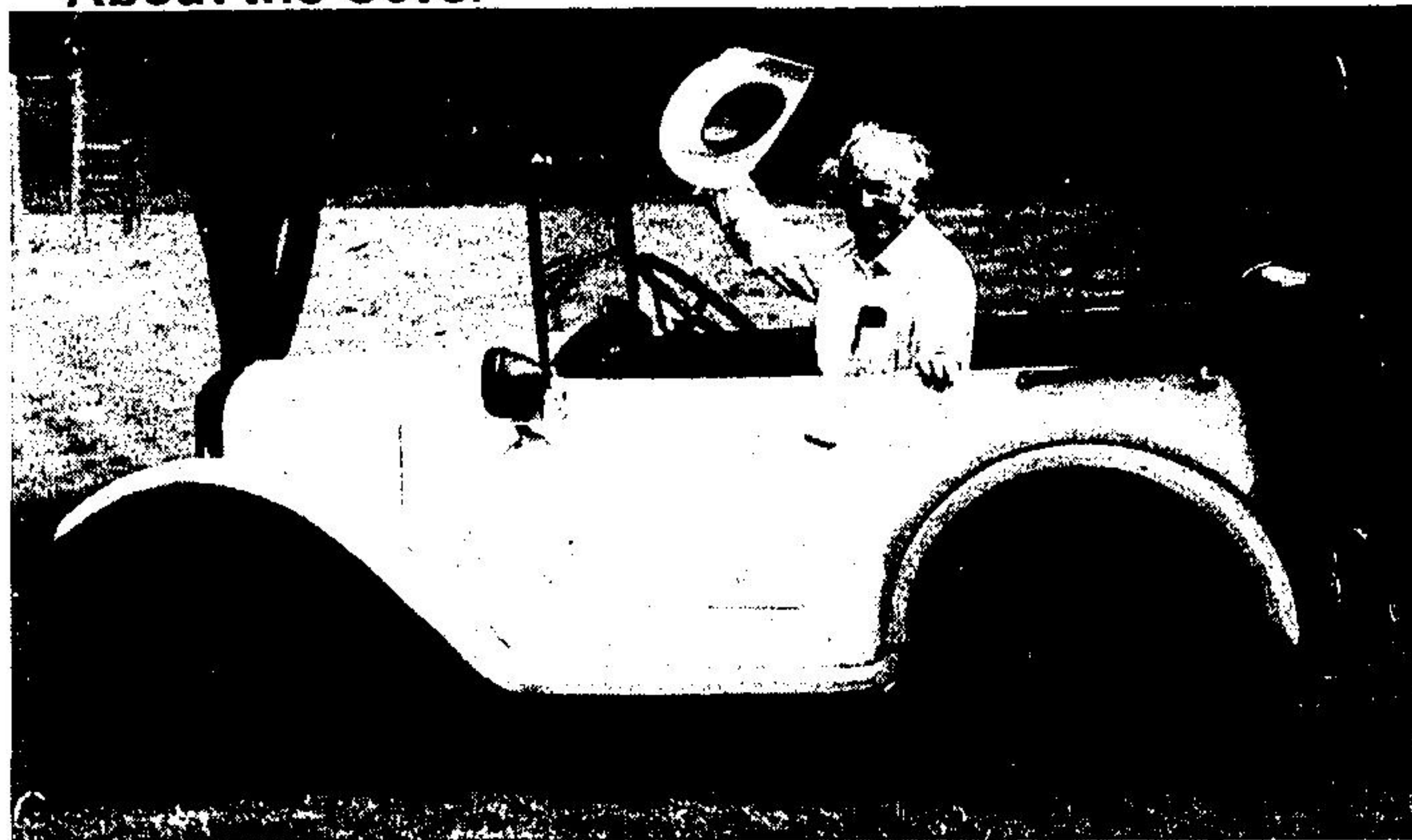
