## Gas line evacuation

Halton Regional Police report two Acton residences were evacuated after construction workers representing Atlas Corporation broke a gas line while digging in the area of Wallace St. and Division St. Police closed Wallace St. from 2:59 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Tuesday while waiting for Union gas workers to arrive and cap the leak. A fire department spokesperson said it was a fairly large natural gas leak, which is a highly flammable substance. The spokesperson explained that if someone had lit something up in the area, there could have been an explosion. Police say there were no injuries as a result of the leak and there was no damage other than to the gas pipe.

#### Vehicle vandalized

Police report a 1984 Toyota Celica, which was parked on a person's residence on Main St. in Georgetown, was scratched all over Monday night. Police believe keys may have been used by the unknown culprits to scratch every part of the vehicle. Damage is estimated at \$3,100.

## Stereo equipment stolen

Three thousand dollars worth of stereo equipment has been reported missing from a car police report. Between May 27 and 28, unknown persons smashed the victim's passenger window of the car while it was parked on McFarlane Drive near Guelph Street in Georgetown and removed the stereo equipment. Police are continuing to investigate.

### School equipment stolen

Police suspect that an Electrohome television and Sharp VCR may have been stolen from Georgetown District High School during the prom held Friday night. They say sometime between Friday and Monday, the equipment, valued at \$750, was taken from the school.

## Overheated stove

Halton Hills firefighters took approximately an hour-and-a-half to extinguish a small blaze in a Georgetown garage, located on a residential property Sunday afternoon. The fire started when a wood stove in the garage overheated. Firefighters estimate damage at \$500 to the walls of the garage.

Halton Hills firefighters say they don't know how long a man was trapped inside his totalled 1984 Porsche before two off-duty firefighters found him in a farmer's field at 17 Sideroad and 10th Line at 5:22 a.m. Thursday morning.

The two off-duty firefighters called police and the Halton Hills fire department who needed an extrication tool to pry open the driver's door and remove 39-year-old Ross West of Oakville from the wreck of his car

his car.

Firefighters believe Mr. West lost control of the car on a curve on 17 Sideroad and skidded approximately 100 feet before rolling over and settling in the farmer's field.

Mr. West was taken to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital. He was still in hospital Thursday afternoon.

Firefighters also responded to three other calls this week. One was to a home on Bairstow Crescenbt where occupants were complaining there was a smell of burning rubber in their home. Firefighters found that the furnace motor belt had seized up and was burning. There was

on Wednesday, firefighters responded to a medical assist call on the 4th Line, north of 10 Sideroad but weren't required to administer oxygen as ambulance crews had already arrived.

Also on Wednesday, firefighters responded to an alarm activation at the Bennett Centre in Georgetown. Firefighters say the alarm was caused by a malfunction in one of the smoke detectors.

# Region lauded by CVCA

Halton Region's building practices on projects it has done along the Credit River have been outstanding, said Credit Valley Conservation Authority General Manager Vicki Barron Wednesday

In making the comment during the Regional Planning and Public Works Committee meeting, Ms. Barron said other municipalities have not always exemplified Halton's concern for the Credit River when constructing projects along its banks.

According to Ms. Barron, poor construction practices, especial-

ly with respect to land stripping by municipalities and private industry, are the major cause behind a Credit River pollutant sediment. Sediment is comprised of soil particles from land stripped during the construction process, said Ms. Barron. Upon entering the Credit as runoff, the particles can destroy spawing areas for fish, she said.

Aside from commending the Region's construction practices to ensure sediment runoff into the river doesn't occur, Ms. Barron also urged committee members

to force private industry to exercise the same care.

Ms. Barron urged councillors to implement a bylaw requiring any developer to re-vegetate a stripped piece of land along the river within a certain time period.

She predicted there would be opposition to such a bylaw, but the river's health depended on it.

General Committee recommended staff write a report on the feasibility of such a bylaw. Halton Region Council will vote on the recommendation this Wednesday.
