

Police Beat

Assault charge

Halton Regional Police report a Georgetown man has been charged with assault level one after he struck his girlfriend in the face at a public restaurant Friday night. Police say the 25-year-old man, who cannot be identified, to protect the identity of the victim, was in a Georgetown restaurant with friends when his temporary live-in girlfriend and him started arguing. The argument escalated and he struck her in the face, knocking her to the floor, say police. Then he began throwing tables, chairs and beer bottles around causing damage and further assaulted the victim who was trying to get the accused out of the restaurant. Police charged the man with mischief, assault and breach of probation. He appeared in Milton court Monday for a bail hearing.

Tired intruder

An Acton woman whose house was illegally entered Friday night told police nothing is missing and the unknown culprit had only slept in her bed. Police say the suspect entered a window on the second floor of the River Street home in Acton and entered all rooms of the house before clearing the victim's bed and sleeping in it. The suspect was seen on the roof of the home by a neighbor but was gone when police arrived. The man is described as white, approximately 18-24 years of age with dark hair. He was wearing blue jeans. Police are continuing their investigation.

Impaired driving

Police say a man who disobeyed a stop sign at high speed on Trafalgar Road severely damaged his 1988 Ford Mustang last Tuesday. They report the Mississauga man was northbound on Trafalgar Road when he ran a stop sign at Hwy. 7 and entered the north ditch. The man wasn't injured but was charged with impaired driving.

Strikes pole

A man who tried to miss a rabbit on the road severely damaged his car May 23 police say. The Guelph man, driving a 1990 Honda, was eastbound on 32 Side Road when a rabbit ran out in front of him. He tried to swerve to avoid the animal but lost control of the car and struck a pole. He wasn't injured. No charges were laid.

Gone fishing!

Police say \$2,200 worth of fishing regulations and licences were stolen off the porch of a Norval man's house overnight May 23. The box of fishing licenses was left on the porch by a courier company while the complainant was out. The box was later recovered on Winston Churchill Boulevard with 200 fishing licenses missing. Police are still investigating.

Truck stripped

A Georgetown man who left his truck parked overnight Thursday at Norval Meat Packers found his truck up on bricks and his stereo and cellular telephone stolen Friday morning. Police say \$4,500 worth of equipment was taken off the 1989 Ford truck. Police are continuing their investigation.

Rural break-in

Police haven't determined how much property was stolen from a rural Georgetown residence Friday but say several items are missing. Police say unknown suspects kicked in the front door of the house, forcing a deadbolt to rip through the door frame while entering the house. Once inside they entered all rooms, stealing a microwave, speakers and jewelry. Police are still investigating.

Dentures stolen

A woman's \$438 dentures were stolen from her car along with a pair of prescription glasses and a gold bracelet last Tuesday night say police. The woman left her car parked in the underground parking lot on Park Avenue in Georgetown and when she returned found the items, valued at \$983 missing.

Smoking harms the environment

It is Canadian Environment Week and the Canadian Cancer Society would like to take it's hat off to the younger generation of environmentally aware individuals, who show their social conscience in environmental preservation methods. There are many facts that the C.C.S. would like you to keep in mind about the environment, tobacco and us. If you are environmentally conscious, the following are a few salient facts that will surely prevent you from or assist you in your decision to quit smoking.

Our Environment at Large:
- In the developing world, the equivalent of one tree is burned for every 300 cigarettes manufactured (Canadian youth smoke 6 million cigarettes a day)
- Cigarettes use up a lot of paper - not just the paper in

which the cigarettes are rolled, but also the paper that makes up the packs in which the cigarettes are sold

- A modern cigarette manufacturing machine uses 4 miles of paper an hour

- It takes 150 large trees to cure about 1 acre of tobacco. Tobacco leaves are cured by fire and are kept at a high temperature for about a week

- Whenever tobacco is grown, food is not. If the land used for tobacco was used for growing food, there would be enough food to feed 10 to 20 million people

- It takes more than 5 years for a cigarette butt to biodegrade.

Our Immediate Environment:
- Environmental Tobacco Smoke (ETS) is air pollution caused by the presence of tobacco smoke. It is very dangerous; there is no safe level of exposure.

- ETS contains at least 60 cancer causing substances, as

well as approximately 4000 other chemicals (e.g., cyanide, arsenic, ammonia, nicotine, formaldehyde).

- There are about 100 times more cyanide in the smoke from 1 cigarette than in the 2 Chilean grapes impounded by the government.

- Children exposed to ETS in their homes have increased risks of breathing problems (bronchitis, asthma attacks), ear infections and pneumonia.

- If you are around smokers, the air you breath could be the same as smoking 2 cigarettes a day.

- Four cigarette butts, eaten, can KILL a baby.

- Over half the fires in which children are killed are caused by careless smoking.
