Guilty plea to environment charge

The unauthorized removal of an island in the Credit River near Terra Cotta last November has led to a Terra Cotta man's guilty plea earlier this month in a Brampton court. -

Mr. Albert Eutenier of Terra Cotta, pleaded guilty to "unlawfully" causing shore lands to be dredged without a work permit contrary to the Public Lands Act administered by the Ministry of Natural Resources. In addition, the dredging was undertaken in contravention of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority's Fill, Construction and Alteration to a Waterways Regulation.

"The Credit River between Norval and Inglewood is considered to be a valuable cold water fish production zone," says Robert Peace, Community Relations Spokesperson for the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

Last fall the first Atlantic salmon were expected to use this section of the Credit to reproduce and for this reason the Ministry of Natural Resources does not authorize or permit any inwater construction work at that time.

"Along with the Ministry of

Natural Resources, the Conservation Authority considers the Credit River to be a top priority fisheries watershed. There are so many destructive implications to fish habitat not to mention the serious flood and erosion potential of this kind of action."


