Streetproofing children

term "streetproofing" likely conjures up for most parents thoughts of protecting their children from perverts and pedophiles, lying in wait to lure their little ones to a horribel fate.

Sharon E. McKay's presentation on streetproofing includes the facts regarding stranger abduction (it's not as common as many believe). It also aims to dispel the myths surrounding child sexual abuse and provide practical advice on how to keep children safe and healthy.

McKay, who lives in Glen Williams with her husband and two sons, writes a weekly family column in the Toronto Star and contributes to Kids Toronto, Today's Parent and Discovery Magazine, among others. She is also the author of three books, Streetproofing Gently and Creatively, The New Child Safety Handbook and The New Parent Survival Handbook, all published in the last five years.

Cathy Jenkins, of the Infant and Toddler Safety Association has high praise for McKay's work. "All too often, books deal-

ing with child safety are too boring, scary and technical to create much safety awareness. Sharon McKay has written one which will be absorbed and enjoyed from cover to cover, and then referred to constantly by parents and caregivers."

In her presentation, McKay discusses "stranger danger" and questions the usefulness of telling kids not to talk to strangers. She also talks about how to explain sexual abuse to a child under five.

McKay believes there is a lot of alarmist behavior today on the subject of sexual abuse of children. "The problem is, we don't know how to listen to children so we know what's really going on with them." She relates anecdotes in her presentation which illustrate this point.
