Tyke rep team playing .500 ball in June

Georgetown O'Toole's Tyke rep team split four of the games it played recently, two of them regular season matches and the others at the Flesherton tournament.

Every good ball team has to take a loss occasionally and this was the case for O'Toole's on June 1. Clarkson defeated Georgetown 7-3. Two runs from the bát of Issac Ferguson and a single from Brent McClung was not enough to keep O'Toole's winning streak alive.

Georgetown was not daunted by their loss to Clarkson. They faced a strong Burlington club on June 4, beating them by two runs. Down 2-0 in the fourth, Georgetown took the lead 5-2, thanks to a solid double from Mark Fedchyshyn. O'Toole's were able to hold Burlington in the fifth with a key double play from shortstop Greg McCullough.

In the top of the seventh inning, Burlington came back to tie the game. With curfew approaching, O'Toole's needed a run to win or they would have to settle for a tie. Leading off the scoring was Greg McCullough Stealing home, followed by Brent McClung. Final score was 7-5 for Georgetown. The winning pitcher was Geoff Bahr with the save going to Brent McClung.

On June 8, O'Toole's travelled to Flesherton for their Mosquito Invitational Tournament. In the first game, Georgetown met Bolton for what proved to be an exciting ball game.

After two innings of play, Georgetown took a 5-3 lead with a triple going to Trevor Rich and runs batted in by Sean Hardcastle and Brent McClung. With pitcher Devon Fraser facing only three batters, Georgetown finished off the inning by scoring another seven runs. RBI's went to Geoff Bahr, Trevor Rich, Robert McLeod, Mark Fedchyshyn, Andrew Nelissen and Devon Fraser.

In the fourth inning Fraser again faced three batters. With hits and runs scored by Rich and Hardcastle, O'Toole's took a 10 run lead. Bolton made a valiant effort to come back in the fifth but to no avail, after five, Georgetown won by a mercy rule

In the second game, Georgetown was in need of a win in order to advance to the finals. O'Toole's faced Port Elgin who had won their first game by a score of 13-6.

Port Elgin started off the scoring early with two well placed

hits down each base line, getting four runs in the first. In the second, Port Elgin scored again, taking a 5-0 lead. The second inning saw a rally from the Georgetown boys coming back
