Senior 'AA' Raiders named organization of century

Georgetown Raiders Senior 'AA' team was voted the organization of the century in its category by the Ontario Hockey Association at its 100th anniversary meeting at the Royal York Hotel in Toronto last Thursday.

From 1935 to 1983, Raiders won eight AA championships, along with being the finalists in six others, a record that earned them the vote from the OHA. Among the teams selected as best organizations, only Hamilton AAA, Toronto Malboros Major Junior A and Waterloo Siskins Junior B won more championships.

Raiders were also voted team of the decade for the 1970's, having won five championships and being finalists twice at the Intermediate A level. Aside from Oshawa Generals Major Junior A organization of 1941-50, they won more championships over a similar length of time. To commemorate the accomplishments, the OHA will be giving banners to the Georgetown Hockey Heritage Council.

Raiders President Finn Poulstrup, a member of the organization that won the Hardy Cup in 1981-82 (Intermediate A Canadian championship), said the executive will try and get the banners duplicated and hung in Gordon Alcott Arena.

"We have a history we'll be able to point to and tell our players they have a real reason to be proud of the team's past. It will help give them an incentive to improve on that heritage."

Over 600 people attended the OHA convention, including several long time Raiders, such as Del Beaumont, a former Raider player in the 1950's and a former NHLer; Bob Hooper, a former Raider general manager and presently a scout for the team; and Barry Wentworth, a team sponsor for 15 years.

In another Georgetown hockey

development, Dave Kentner, a former vice-president of hockey operations and general manager of Raiders in the 1970's, indicated he will not stand as chairman of the Hockey Heritage Council after a 13-year stint in that position.

Earlier this month, Kentner said he had circulated a letter outlining his intent to the council members, but at the organization's June 12 meeting, nobody was prepared to step forward to take on that responsibility.

"I guess after so long, some people didn't seriously believe I wouldn't be continuing as chairman. As a result, we've postponed the election of the new posi-

tions until the July 10 meeting so people will have time to reconsider what they want to do."

Kentner has been a member of the Hockey Heritage Council for 15 years, having been one of the original six members who started the group. While not returning as chairman, he said he will continue to be a part of the council.

"Why I decided not to be chairman requires a very complicated and involved answer. What it boils down to is that my company (Kentner's Catering), like many others, is struggling to get through the recession and I have to devote a lot more of my time to it right now."
