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Rotary welcomes female

The Rotary Club of Georgetown opened its doors to author/teacher Jo Phenix, their first female member, June 3.

"I'm totally for it," says Director and President Elect Barry Timlek, regarding Phenix's induction. "To keep any social club going, you need new blood."

Jo Phenix, a Milton resident, has taught every grade, from one to 12, in England and Canada as well as in-service courses for the Ministry of Education, and the Faculties of Education of the University of Toronto and York University.

Now a free-lance writer, Ms. Phenix has written many books on education including Impressions, the K-7 Language-Arts program from Holt, Rinehart and Winston and Teaching Writing: The Nuts and Bolts of Running a Day-to-Day Writing Program (Pembroke Publishers).

Georgetown Rotary Club president Ian Walker says he is very supportive of the induction of Jo Phenix, and that having women members will bring the club into the 1990's.

"Women tend to be well-organized and have a stick-to-it type attitude which will be very important to our club," states Mr. Walker.

"I'm very happy," says Ms. Phenix, who sees more women becoming members of the Rotary Club in the near future. "I don't think of myself as the first woman in the club. I think of myself as a Rotarian."

Ms. Phenix is the spouse of Rotary Club member Neville Worsnop, who has been in the restaurant and hospitality business for 15 years.

President Ian Walker read the induction ceremony, and presented Ms. Phenix with the Rotary Club Guidelines, books and lapel pin.
