Numbers To Note EMERGENCY

Jewellery discovery

Halton Regional Police report a Georgetown man turned in \$13,000 to \$30,000 worth of jewellery which he found lying by a water plant in Cedarvale Park Wednesday afternoon. Police are looking for the owners of a Girard-Perregaux watch valued between \$3,000 and \$5,000 dollars and a man's ring estimated to be worth approximately \$10,000 to \$25,000. If the jewellery isn't claimed within a certain period of time, the items will be returned to the finder.

Aggravated assault

Police charged a 37-year-old Georgetown with aggravated assault Sunday in connection with the brutal beating of a 33year-old Georgetown man at the Hollywood Tavern in Norval Saturday night. Police say the victim sustained serious injuries to his face after he was repeatedly kicked in the face. A bone over the victim's eye was broken which could cause permanent disfigurement say police. The accused, whom police describe as violent, appeared in Milton court July 2 for a bail hearing.

Sexual assault

Police report a Mississauga man has been charged with sexual assault after a Georgetown woman was assaulted in her home Monday. Police say the accused visited the victim, whom he met the day before, and kissed her on the mouth as she sat in the kitchen. The victim ran to the bathroom where the accused grabbed her and asked her to have intercourse and produce a child. The victim called police who arrested the 32-year-old man. He will appear in Milton court July 29.

Music heist

Police report unknown culprits made off with \$3,199 worth of compact discs, cassettes and collector's cards after they broke into M and R Record Exchange in Georgetown Saturday night. Police say the culprits used a crow bar to open the door of the store. Police are continuing their investigation.

Impaired driving

An Acton man has been charg-

ed with impaired driving after he lost control of the 1987 Ford pickup he was driving and demolished it on 5 Sideroad west of 8th Line Monday. Police say the man was northbound on 5 Sideroad when he lost control of his truck on a curve and went sideways, striking a mailbox. He then went into the ditch, struck a culvert and stopped in a private drive. He and a passenger in the car received minimal injuries.

Failed to stop

A collision at Main St. and Guelph St. June 21 was caused by a driver who failed to stop, police report. Police say the accident occurred when an Acton man, driving a 1989 Chev sedan, approached the stop sign to turn left but did not make a complete stop and struck a 1981 Pontiac driven by a Guelph man who was attempting to turn onto Main St. off Guelph St. The Chev was moderately damaged while the Pontiac was severely damaged. Police charged the Acton man with failing to stop.

Two charges laid

Policed charged an Acton man with mischief and being unlawfully in a dwelling after he forced his way into the house of his ex-girlfriend Saturday. Police say the accused attended the Acton home, broke the door handle on the outside door and forced his way through another inside door. He was arrested at the scene by police. The accused will appear in Milton court July 29.

Weapons seized

Police seized 11 shotguns from a Limehouse residence Sunday after they were called to the scene by a neighbor who witnessed a suspicious looking person lurking around the premises. When police arrived, they found the home had been entered and noticed a man at the scene who fled on foot into the bush. Police chased and caught the suspect who was arrested for break and enter into a house and possession of stolen property. The stolen property, including two motorcycle helmets, a flashlight and large quantity of alcohol was recovered. While at the home, police officers seized shotguns because they were not stored properly.

All quiet in Halton Hills on the weekend

Halton Regional Police detective Sergeant Mike Eacrett said it was a very quiet weekend in Halton Hills this Canada Day weekend.

"I have only one entry in my book and that was to say when I was on duty," he said.

He was pleased to report the Canada Day festivities in Glen Williams went off without any need for police assistance.

But Halton Hills didn't pass through the RIDE program without any problems. Halton Regional Police media relations officer, Sergeant Carey Smith, said two drivers were charged with impaired driving during the RIDE check in town Sunday out of the 970 drivers that were stopped.

In all of Halton, five impaired driving charges were laid out of 2,500 vehicles that were stopped.


What does Canada Day mean to you?
