cluding the University of Alabama, Arizona State, Brigham Young, Murray State, Texas A and M, University of Washington and the University of New Mexico.

The University of New Mexico at Albuquerque most impressed Rieger: "It has a beautiful campus setting at 5,000 feet above sea level surrounded by mountains and the track program is very strong. I think I will be able to reach my potential there."

Under the complicated regulations governing U.S. College athletic competition Rieger is currently eligible for 3 years of running with the university. His scholarship amounts to 80 per cent of his costs with the possibility

of rising to 100 per cent depending on his performance. His academic program will consist of a major in Business with a minor in the Physical Sciences. He must maintain a 2.0 average to retain his scholarship and he will average 15 hours of course work per week plus 3-4 hours of training every day.

Rieger leaves for New Mexico on August 19th and his classes start on the 26th. He expects to be in competition almost immediately with the University track team in the Western Athletic Conference and hopes to be part of New Mexico's determined effort to unseat the perennial champions, Brigham Young.

Keith will concentrate on the 3000m distance for indoor events

and 5000m outdoors and when asked what his longer term goals might be his eyes light up at the barest hint of running for Canada in international events.

At age 23 Rieger might seem a little old to be embarking on a high level running career but in the distances he runs the competitors tend to peak in their late twenties.

Keith is obviously excited about this sudden revival of an almost forgotten skill and the opportunities opening up. "Without the support of my family and friends I probably wouldn't have tried this. I also want to thank my coach at Centennial, Jim Hall - he told me a long time ago that if I worked at it I could be a good runner - well, I'm finally working at it."
