Juvenile champ

Georgetown District High School student Scott Hobbs is the top Juvenile triple jumper in Canada after finishing sixth at the Canadian Junior Track and Field Championships in Winnipeg last weekend.

Hobbs travelled a distance of 13.90 metres, topping his personal best by 55 cm. His coach, Jim Tayler, founder of the Georgetown Athletic Club, said Hobbs surpassed his expectations by several centimetres and came close to the juvenile record he set in 1982 (14,22 metres).

Though Hobbs bruised his ankle slightly, Tayler said his athlete will be competing in the Royal Canadian Legion Ontario Juvenile Championships in Windsor today (Friday) and Saturday. The top two in each event will compete in the National Legion Championships at York Universitylater in August.
