After working out some family concerns, Jim Tayler, founder fo the Georgetown Athletic Club, has now decided he will go to Tokyo to compete in the World Championships August 24-September 2 as a member of the Canadian Track and Field team.

Tayler, a Georgetown resident, said his 8.18 metre long jump at the Ontario Relays and Multiple Events Championship in Toronto on June 22 made him one of the top three chosen to make the long jump team.

"To make the 'A' standard, you needed to jump over eight metres and only one other guy aside from myself has done it so far. There is still the National Championships at Montreal (July 25-28) where I'm going to try and make the triple jump team as well."

To qualify for the triple jump, Tayler said he needs a distance of 16.50 metres which he said he is close to achieving.

Presently, Tayler is considering expanding his athletic events in order to compete in the decathalon, pending the outcome of this summer's competition.

Matt Brain, one of Tayler's athletic club members, is also enjoying success in track and field competition, placing first in the 15 and under high jump (1.75 metres) at the Royal Canadian Legion Provincial Championships in Windsor on the weekend. His top finishing qualifies him for the National Legion championships, being held at York University August 10-11.

Competing in the javelin, Brain also came close to qualifying, but placed third with a distance of 39.60 metres. Teammate Scott Hobbs placed sixth in the triple jump with a distance of 12.92 metres
