
Do you like insects?




Joel Cunningham, 9, Georgetown: "Not really. They bite you and they squirm around. They really bother me."

What it means to sleepwalk

There is a sleep center in your brain, which regulates the sleeping and waking of your body.

When this sleep center goes to work, it does two things: It blocks off part of your brain so that it goes to sleep and you no longer have the will to do anything; and, it blocks off certain nerves that bring outside messages to your brain, permitting your body to fall asleep.

Usually, the sleep center of your brain and your body are connected but sometimes they become separated.

When this happens, the brain sleeps but the body remain: awake. People in this situation usually sit up in bed or stand near it. Some actually get out of bed and walk around, but they don't do much more than walk.

A sleepwalker doesn't usually remember sleepwalking when he or she wakes up.

Sleep walking is far more common in children than in adults.
