Georgetown's hottest hitter, Steve Gibbons, led off the bottom of the third inning with a long double and alertly scooted home on Kelly's ground out.

In the bottom of the fourth, Andrew Nelissen (a major tyke call up) crushed a ball deep to centre, good for two bases. He then stole third base before coming home

on Kevin Humeniski's double. Todd Bussell followed with a single and after Humeniski stole third, Doug Inglis launched a ball to deep right field for a three run homer.

A 5-0 lead should have been safe, but three costly errors and three double plays turned by Bloor in the last three innings spelled disaster for Georgetown as they went down to a 6-5 defeat.

It was a heartbreaking loss but the boys had nothing to be ashamed of. Kelly struck out eight batters and gave up only three earned runs. This pitching performance, added to his RBI and sacrifice allowed him to share Player of the Game honors with Inglis, whose home run was the team's only one of the season.
