

No chances by soccer Falcons leads to 1-1 tie with Chemist

The Canadian outthrusted the visitors from the opening kick off and scored three first half goals. The last goal in the second half came from a luxurious diving header following a pretty left wing move.

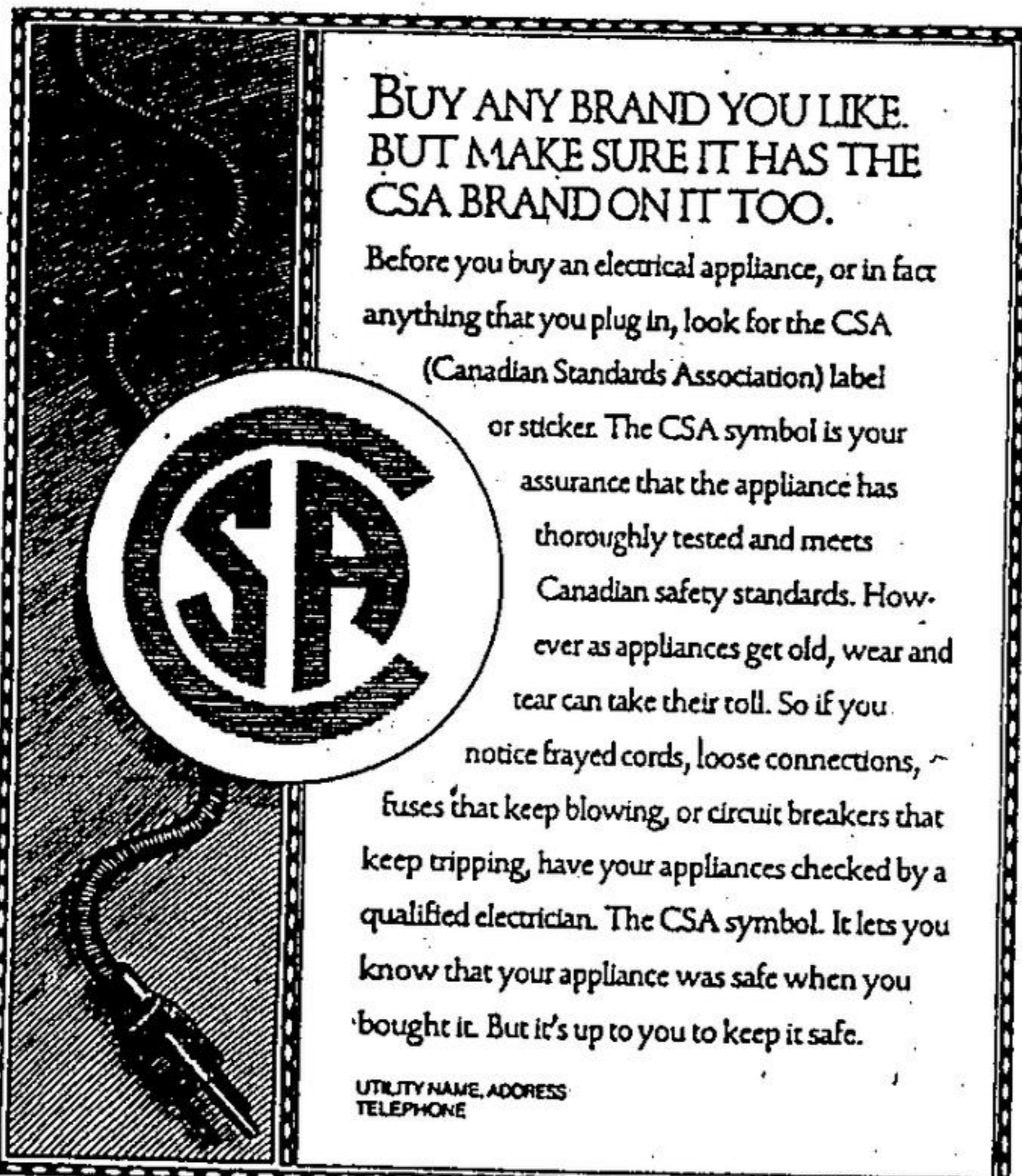
