FWIC elects new president

To become Canadian President of an organization during its centenary year is an honor few obtain. However when that organization was founded in Ontario and then spread throughout the world the honor is even more important, an honor even less people obtain.

Such an honor and responsibility was bestowed on Charlotte Johnson, a Women's Institute member from Cochrane Ontario. At the recent Triennial Conference of Federated Women's Institutes of Canada (FWIC), Charlotte Johnson was elected President-Elect, with Jenny Linde from British Columbia as President. The culmination of Charlotte's term as President will occur with the 100th Anniversary Celebrations and FWIC Convention to be held in Toronto on June 21-30th, 1997.

Charlotte is a partner in the family business in Cochrane. She is a member of the Clute Branch of Women's Institute, where she has held most offices there as well as at District and Area. In 1983-86 she was President of Federated Women's Institutes of Ontario, where she was instrumental in getting the major changes to the structure and outlook of FWIO started. She was a Council Member of Associated

Country Women of the World 1983-86 and led the Ontario delegation to the ACWW Conference in Ireland in 1986.

She has been a farmer 4H member and leader for many years, as well as being very active in her community. In 1988 she was elected to her local Board of Education.

Charlotte believes there is a continuing need for organized women's groups, and that WI meets that need through the educational programme it offers. As an organization that is nearing its centenary it has become an organization that is respected by all levels of government for its submissions made by resolutions and briefs. WI gives women an opportunity to develop leadership and organizational skills as well as serving their communities by using these skills in many ways.

Ontario had other successes at the Conference as well.

Ramsay WI, from Lanark North took first place with their Community History.

As well Andy Schuler a student from Guelph Area won first place in the Past President's Essay competition with third place going to Angela Hart from Enterprise.

Third place in the poem section went to Mrs. Verna Sewers from Brant-Greenoch WI Bruce East.

Furnace maintenance a safety essential

Consumers who opt for cheap furnace maintenance work this year may be playing with fire, say experts at Ontario's Consumer Ministry.

"By hiring the first person who offers to inspect their furnace, consumers can lose more than money. They may compromise their family's safety, too," says John Gerdels, acting director of the ministry's Fuels Safety Branch.

A defective or out-of-adjustment heating system can cause death by carbon-monoxide poisoning or fire. Because of the dangers, consumers are advised to have their furnaces checked out and cleaned every year by a heating contractor registered with the branch.

Registered contractors will inspect the entire heating system and tell the homeowner about any problems. But letting someone who isn't qualified to do the work only gives consumers a false sense of security.

In one case last winter, a Pickering man was found guilty of conducting home-furnace contracting work without being registered with the Fuels Safety Branch.

He had telephoned Toronto-area homeowners and told them their furnaces were due for inspection. Then he went to four residences and was paid for work performed.

In addition to not being registered as a contractor, he did not have a valid gas fitter's certificate, as required under the Energy Act to ensure proper and safe inspection and repairs to gas furnaces.

"We hope consumers will use caution when hiring contractors for annual heating-system inspections and repairs this year," says Gerdels. "A good start is to ask friends or fuel suppliers to recommend an expert. If in doubt, consumers should call our branch at (416) 234-6030 to make sure the contractor's registered."

Consumers should also find out if the costs of repairs that may be required are covered by a service plan or warranty. If not, they should ask for written estimates from three companies before they sign a contract. The estimate should outline the work needed, who will do it, and start-up and finish dates.

Telling the contractor about any warning signs from the last heating season will help make his or her job easier.

These may include:

- an unusual noise from the furnace;
- water stains around the furnace or chimney;
- strange odors from the furnace or through forced-air vents anywhere in the house;
- a pilot light that goes out repeatedly, or a furnace that can't be restarted following the manufacturer's instructions.

Backdrafts, soot or dampness at the base of the chimney are frequently signs the chimney is partly blocked by crumbling brick and loose mortar. This dangerous condition sometimes occurs after heating systems have been converted from oil to natural gas. Chimney repairs or a metal liner will eliminate this potentially dangerous hazard.

Deadly doses of carbon monoxide, a colorless and odorless gas, can be produced in any fuel-burning system that's starved for air.

Gerdels says, "Unqualified people should never tamper with a heating system, but homeowners can help make sure their system's running safely through the year by following some simple steps."

- Change furnace filters at least twice a heating season on forced-air systems.
- Don't block warm-air outlets and cold-air returns with furniture or cover them with carpets.
- Examine the furnace and chimney from time to time for signs of corrosion, leakage or water stains.
- Keep bleaches, water softeners and other corrosive materials away from the furnace.
- Make sure the heating system's air supply isn't cut off by walls or other obstructions when renovation work is being done.
- Keep the area around the furnace free from dust, lint, rags, paint and other chemicals or combustible materials that could catch fire or explode if they become too hot.
