Time for work on your perennial gardens

Herbaceous perennials are flowers and grasses that bloom for more than one year. All foliage and blooms die back when Jack Frost comes to town in September.

Has he been to your garden? If so, it's time to start working at refurbishing your perennial gardens. The tops may be dead but the roots persist, Some perennials can live forever it seems, but the fact is the soil deteriorates and the plants weaken. Even though you can keep up nutrient availability with chemical fertilizers, the soi.structure loses its capacity for optimum air and water movement.

With chemical fertilizers another thing you must contend with is turning your perennial garden into a voracious herbaceous monster. The perennial then takes over the

Fall is an excellent time to dig, divide and replant those amazing root systems. Just as those dependable bulbs of spring get bedded in for winter, perennials too can be planted for next, year's performance. It's a great time to plant!

As perennials establish themselves they increase their root systems. Many perennials form what is known as a crown. Take a close look and you will see the crown consists of an older harder centre which was the original plant. Set out surrounding this parent plant will be a multitude of baby . plants.

Lift the root clump with a digging fork and loosen the soil so you can determine easy separation. Place your E.T. fingers at the narrow points and pull apart. If it's a tough bond use a sharp knife at the narrow area. The segments or plantlets should have fibrous roots. These little youngsters are ready to

leave the nest and be planted independently. Taking note of where stems came up will also direct you in determining what is worth planting.

Inspect your roots and make sure any older parts are discarded. If any parts of roots are soft or infected they too are destined for the compost. Plant only what is healthy and firm.

So you're ready to replant. Hardly! You must now start all over again. Yes, you must rototill or fork your soil working it to a depth of 12"-15". Add in the proper amounts of peatmoss, manure and bonemeal, remember these plants will need enough for another three to five years to perform to blue ribbon status.

In our sandy soils, I would recommend minimum one third peat moss, one third black earth or loam, one part existing soil. Use 2 oz. per square yard of bonemeal and thoroughly, and I mean

thoroughly, mix to a consistent, uniform appearance. Now you're ready to plant those youngsters.

During the time between digging and replanting you should lay these offsets on trays and moisten them with a fine mist to hold them until all the preparation is done.

If you are moving perennials from one location to another, be sure the exposure is suitable for that particular plant type.

It is also advisable to de a ph test prior to planting to be sure conditions are just right. Soil ph should be neutral 6.5. If it's too low add dolomitic limestone at the recommended rates on the bag. Likewise if the ph is too high add aluminum sulphate to reduce the ph to the appropriate level.

Mark out the area and position of plants before setting them out.

After planting, thoroughly soak your soil with transplant solution. Water soluble transplant solutions are available from almost all

fertilizer companies with the analysis of 10-52-10 on the package. It's immediately available to the plant and really promotes quick root growth. This should only be

applied once to healthy plants. Mulch can be applied immediately to retain warm moist soil, form good rooting and an excellent responsive garden next year.

Q: My pine trees are turning brown on the inside. Are they dying?

A: No. Your trees are not dying. In fact, what your trees are telling you is they've had a hot summer and they're now reducing their moisture content for over winter. White pine retain only one year's growth of needles. Red, and Scotch pine hold 2 years growth, so it's a sign of survival.

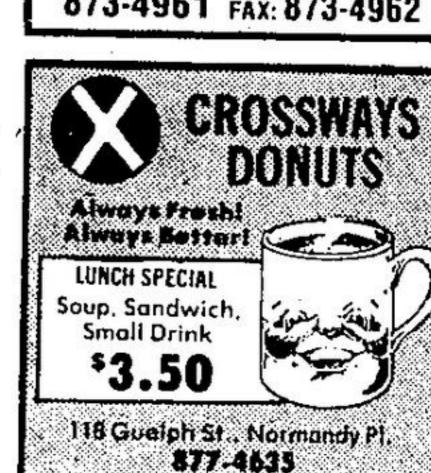

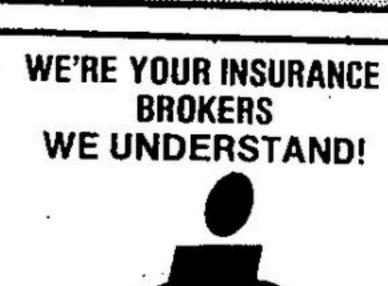

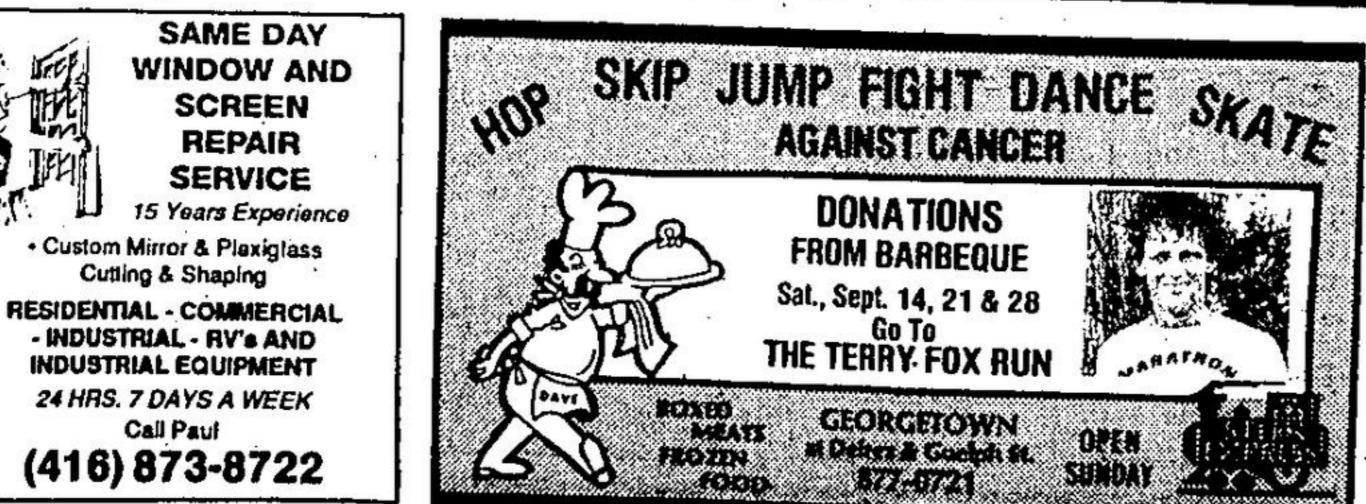
