

#### Waterfowl hunt

### 1991 season underway

MEADOWVALE - The 1991 Water Fowl hunt gets underway Thursday, September 26, 1991 and runs until October 31, 1991. Hunting times are one half hour before sunrise to 12 noon Saturday and 4 p.m. to half an hour after sunset on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

"The Reservoir has 13 blinds available this year," says C.V.C.A. spokesperson Robert Peace. Some are accessible by boat only and blinds are assigned on a first come first serve basis."

No gasoline powered boats are allowed on the Reservoir and all

hunters must have a boat or trained dog to retrieve birds.

"The intent of the hunt is to manage the wildlife resources of the area by balancing the populations to the carrying capacity of the sight while gathering species data," says Peace.

The Orangeville Reservoir is located just off Highway 10 at Orangeville. A \$7.50 admission is charged per hunter per day.
