

#### EMERGENCY INFORMATION VIAL

The Halton Regional Police Service in co-operation with National Trust are introducing the Emergency Information. Vial to the residents of Halton during the month of October.

The "Emergency Information Vial" is aimed at providing emergency services personnel with important medical information that could be crucial in administering aid to a victim in a medical emergency.

When you receive your vial (which looks like a pill container) you must:

1. Fill out the information sheet inside your vial which provides emergency personnel with vital information such as a current medication, hospital, references, etc.

Return information sheet to vial and place in refrigerator door.

3. Put sticker on outside of refrigerator. This will alert emergency personnel to pick up the vial and take it to the hospital with the patient.

You can obtain your "vial" by calling the Acton Police Station at 853-2050, or by going to the Acton or Georgetown Police Station. The Georgetown Firehall also has a supply.

Vials and assistance in completing the form can be obtained from Acton Social Services and Information Centre, 19 Willow St. N., Acton. 853-3310.

#### **ONTARIO GOVERNMENT NOTICE INFORMATION CENTRE**

Highway 401 From Highway 410 to Trafalgar Road Pre-Design and Concept Study

The Ministry of Transportation is conducting a pre-design study for the section of Highway 401 between the Highway 410/403 Interchange and the vicinity of the future Mavis Road crossing (located approximately midway between First and Second Line West). Concept plans for the widening of Highway 401 from the vicinity of the future Mavis Road to Trafalgar Road are also being developed. Various widening alternatives have been studied by the ministry's Study Team to address the need for increased highway tapacity. The study has involved consideration of the long term roles of all major roads in the area, including municipal arterial roads and the ultimate freeway network.

A technically-preferred concept has been developed for the proposed 401 expansion. An Information Centre is being held to allow the public an opportunity to view the study work and the proposed preliminary design and concept plans for the Highway 403 widening, and to discuss the project with members of the ministry's Study Team. Input from residents, land owners, and other interested parties will be used in the subsequent detail design of the improvements between Highway 401/403 and the future Mavis Road, and as reference during a future Preliminary Design Study addressing the section of Highway 401 between the future Mavis Road and Trafalgar Road. These future design studies will fallow a Class Environmental Assessment process, approved for highway projects of this type, and will involve further public programs and submission of Environmental Study Report(s) to the Ministry of Environment.
