
I feel very sorry for the people in the world who are less fortunate than myself. Please help them so they can live better lives. And the last thing is, please let

# Don't get upset by the future

Have you made any pickles or relish, or packed away some squash and potatoes in a cold part of the cellar? Have you laid away some wood for the fireplace this winter? Have you checked that the wind won't find its way through the seals around your windows?

"Take no thought for the morrow," Jesus said, "for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself." One of the newer translations puts it, "do not be anxious about tomorrow." Jesus is simply telling us not to worry about the future: he's not advising us to be careless about it.

once knew a man who took literally the idea that he shouldn't think about the next day, and he quit his job so that he could study the Bible. That might have been OK if he had only himself to care for, but he had a wife and children to look after as well. It's

one thing to trust in God, and a very different thing to presume that God will do everything for you.

There are lots of places where Jesus warns us to think about the future: the house-builder has to make sure he has a good foundation: the king going to battle has to know he has enough troops.

The only time you can legitimately say. "Have faith. God will provide," is when you have done your share to look after yourself.

The book of Acts tells how some early Christians pooled their goods and their wealth together. Then in Paul's letters we read how he had to warn against idlers: all can eat from the common lot, but only when they've contributed their work. Take care for the future, then trust to God.

Nor should you let your preparations get out of hand. You don't want to be like the greedy

farmer who filled his barns with grain, and then discovered that he was ready to live, but not ready to die. We can't protect ourselves against everything. Despite our efforts, we might be struck by a heart attack, or an accident on the 401 when other drivers lose their sanity during rush hour, and risk their lives and ours to get to their destination five minutes earlier.

Ultimately our trust in God does give a real security. That trust may not enable us to escape the ills of life; but it can give us confidence that in the bad times as well as the good, in death as well as in life, we are in God's hands.

Don't get upset by the future. For which of us by worrying can accomplish anything? So make your prudent preparations, and enjoy your home-made relish this winter, and be confident that at all times you are in God's hands.
