

Mayoralty candidate believes in citizen input

Local mayoralty candidate Rob Barlow of Limehouse, says the Town relies too much on Halton Regional staff to attract industry to Halton Hills.

Mr. Barlow, who has been building a house in Limehouse for the past three years, points out Halton Hills is only mentioned twice, on the front and back cover, of Halton's brochure used to promote the Region. "There is nothing in the middle about the Town; it's all about Burlington, Milton and Oakville," he said.

Mr. Barlow compares the mayor's job to that Chief Executive Officer for a major corporation. He explains just as a CEO spends a lot of time outside the company promoting what the company offers, the mayor's job is to spend a

lot of time outside the municipality trying to entice businesses to relocate in Halton Hills.

Mr. Barlow favors service-type industry. In order to attract this sort of industry, the computer systems salesman says, the Town should follow on the heels of the Olde Hide House.

That means promoting the Town's rural surroundings and historical sites such the house of well-known Canadian author Lucy Maude Montgomery located in Norval, he said.

Mr. Barlow said, if elected, he would give up his current job. His previous political experience includes sitting on the Deep River Council from 1983-84. He didn't sit on council for the final year of the three-year term deciding instead to

take a job in Ottawa.
Another high priority for Mr.

Barlow is stopping the Acton dump proposal from going ahead. In order to stop the proposal, it isn't enough for the Town to send letters to Ontario Environment Minister Ruth Grier protesting the proposal.

Town officials should try to meet with Ms. Grier, and if the minister refuses to meet then they should go to her office and wait there until she changes her mind, he explained.

Asked if he supports high density residential development, Mr. Barlow said the amount of water available in Georgetown will go a long way in determining the type of residential development suitable for the area.

Finally, Mr. Barlow believes the public commenting rules must be changed to make it easier for the general public to comment on

issues such as a proposal by the Niagara Escarpment Commission to ban the establishment of landfills on the escarpment.

To have commented on this proposal throughout a recently held hearing, legal representation was needed because of the way the hearing was conducted, said Mr. Barlow.

"You have to allow people to represent themselves without the high cost of doing it," he said.

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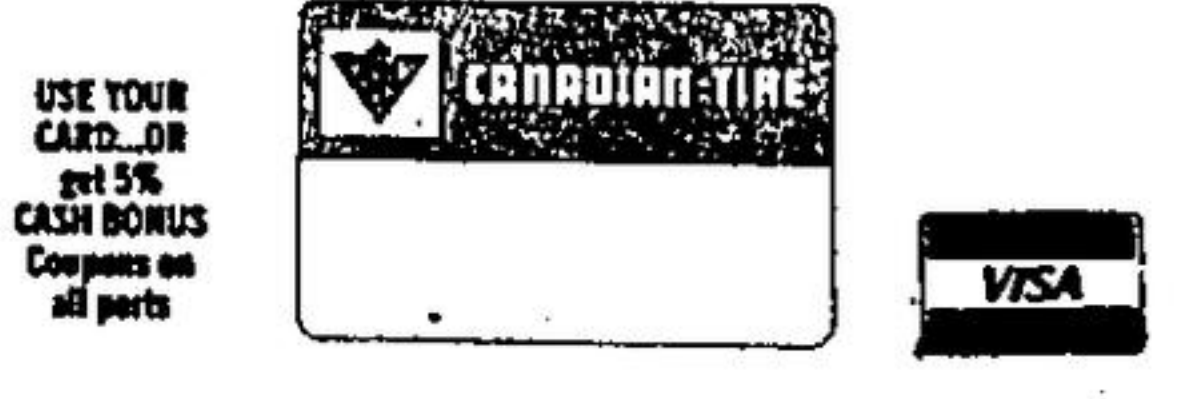
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
