### Junior and Senior Rebs advance to finals

E.C. Drury looked like contenders in the final game with a much improved defence but fell short as the Rebels walked away with a 15-12 win and the right to advance to the semi-finals.


In the semi-finals, the senior squad had an even harder time against a strong M.M. Robbinson

"We played the best volleyball of the season this week," said a satisfied coach Bob MacKay, "We are looking forward to the finals."




