directors, are now studying their options, Mr. Oliver said the dilemma will be solved at least in part by delivering services more efficiently.

Mr. Oliver said the hopsital has already taken steps towards achieving this goal by purchasing equipment to do Laparscopic Cholecystectomy (gallbladder) surgery.

This new procedure significantly reduces the hospital stay of a patient after surgery, resulting in a happier patient and lower hospital costs, said Mr. Oliver.

According to recent statements by Ontario Health Minister Frances Lankin, cholestoral testing and caesarian sections could be two areas in which hospitals could cut costs.

Mr. Oliver said Georgetown hospital does fewer caesarian sections per number of pregnant women delivering at the hospital than the provincial average.

Mr. Oliver points out the decision to do a caesarian section is the doctor's call.

There are no definitive provincial guidelines doctors are required to follow when deciding whether or not a caesarian section should be performed, he said.

However, Mr. Oliver did say the

hospital can review the criteria its doctors are using to make the decision and ensure this criteria follows that of other hospitals known to provide good quality obstetrical care.

As for cholestoral testing, Mr. Oliver explained the publicity surrounding the unhealthiness of having high cholestoral during the

past few years has resulted in an increase by the public for cholestoral testing.

To reduce this demand, Mr. Oliver said, the public must be better educated on when and how often cholestoral testing is necessaary.

Current requests for the test can range from occassionally to every other week, he said.

Although uncommitted, area Regional councillors see no reason why they wouldn't support the reappointment of Halton Regional Chairman Peter Pomeroy on Dec.

It's on this day the newly-elected Regional council elects a new Regional Chairman for the new three-year political term.

Local Regional councillors, Pam Johnston, Marilyn Serjeantson and Mayor Russ Miller all agreed Mr. Pomeroy did an excellent job representing Halton in the position of Regional chairman during the last three years.

\$70,000 per year position.

He first wants to meet with the new Regional council to discuss the current police investigation into possible wrongdoings by Halton elected and non-elected officials before making a final decision.

Any eligible voter in Halton can run for the chairman position as long as the person has the support of two Regional councillors.

John Fleming, Halton's Chief Administrative Officer, compares the

chairman's role to that of a mayor. The Chairman is the leader of Regional Council, said Mr. Fleming.

In practice, the chairman is usually someone with council background at some level, he said.

Mayor Miller said he couldn't comment on who he would vote for until he knew who exactly was running for the chairman position.

However, he added "in my opinion Mr. Pomeroy is the best chairman the Region has ever had."


"I'm very pleased with everything he has done," added Mayor Miller.




