

Post-election comments by Mayor criticized

Their concerns are not being fabricated for effect - they're for real. The strength of a community is a reflection of the strength of its citizens.
Your reference to a "dirty campaign" brings back memories of the "dirty campaign" that was waged in Halton Hills three years ago, particular-

ly in the election for mayor.

Then back to the "How long have you lived here?" syndrome which seems to be a major concern in Halton Hills.
Apparently, the rate of a person's mobility is in direct relation to their credibility.
The times - they are a changing, and frankly, Mr. Mayor, your attitude will be critical for all of us during the next three years.
