People are dialing our number (519-O CANADA) and ordering a copy of the new music.

Radio stations across Canada have been sent a copy and more than 250 agreed to play the new O Canada at noon on New Year's Day. The response has been enthusiastic and rewarding.

This week we are also mailing 14,200 copies of both versions of the anthem to every school in Canada. The postage on that mailing alone is over \$30,000 - and all this money, along with the other costs, is donated. This is a gift to Canada and its young people for the 125th birthday of our country.

Sounds corny, I know. But my

After the press conference last week, I drove home, listening to the new anthem being played on the radio - it was quite an experience, after months of toiling away. The stress level had been intense, as the four of us scrambled to pay bills, meet commitments, woo the country's best singers into participating and arrange for everything from manufacturing compact discs to negotiating a television program contract.

But, against all odds, it all worked. And along the way we managed to employ about 100 musicians, keep a couple of factories open through an entire weekend and even give gainful work to a composer!

I hope you have an early chance to hear the music, and I

hope you like it. On a shw which CFRB broadcast, seven of every 10 callers were very enthusiastic about the new anthem, the other three think there's something very wrong in messing with O Canada.

But, mess we did. Complete with a wailing guitar and the likes of Gino Vanelli, Luba, Rita MacNeil and Allanah Myles allsinging their hearts out for ( Canada.
