

Dangers of frostbite

Most injuries in outdoor sports are musculoskeletal but cold injuries are a significant - largely preventable - hazard. Cold injuries can occur in virtually any outdoor sport, not just those traditionally associated with winter.

Factors that Predispose Athletes to Cold Injury

Cold injuries can be divided into two categories: local injury or hypothermia. However, the two are interrelated. Maintaining body core temperature, as well as protecting vulnerable parts, is necessary to prevent frostbite, the type of local cold injury seen most often in athletes.

Be smart when you are exposed to the elements. Make sure all of your extremities are well covered and dry.

Be smart carry warm clothing and a blanket in your car, just in case you need them.

Be smart and enjoy the winter season by being active.
