Canadian Trivia

Eleven per cent of Canadians suffer from chronic pain - pain that persists for six months or more. Some experts say conditions that cause such pain like lower back ache and migraines disables more people than either heart disease or cancer.

Just slightly more than one in five Canadians go to church, though four out of five say they believe in God and the divinity of Jesus. In the early 1950s, seven out of 10 Canadians went to church.

Second only to the United States, Canada has the most shopping malls in the world. There are about 300 large regional shopping centres in the country and many more smaller malls. Malls take 51 per cent of all retail sales in Canada (aside from automobile purchases). Shopping malls are the third most frequented place for Canadians after home and work.

Eighty-three thousand Canadians have served on twenty-six international peace keeping missions for the United Nations since the Second World War.
