Time to plan ahead for future generations

The label on the container from the A Round-Tuitt Pharmacy reads "Time Control Pills" prescribed by Dr. Al Hughs Dup and Dr. Boyit Flies. The jelly beans in the container with this label are an attempt to see the funny side of our obsession with time. Our attempts to make, manage, find and control time, come from our value system that values time above many things.

This is the second article on examining our values to see whether we can learn from other societies. The following (with permission) is a portion of a long article from the January/February issue of "Earthkeeper" magazine. The article by Henry Lickers, a native grandfather, tries to



answer the question of his young granddaughter. "Grandfather. what makes us different?"

Time is very important to the Western society. In order to dominate, there must be a plan with a timetable which can not be violated. A frantic individual effort must be made to stay on schedule, since a person lives for such a short time.

Planning is seen as a short term activity, less than 14 generation. Any characteristic which helps to maintain the schedule is

considered benesicial. Understanding and sensitivity are sacrificed for control and logic.

The First Nations, with an Earth-centred view, see "place" as most important; therefore mountains, lands, lakes and streams become sacred. The effort of an individual is not tied to the schedule but to a place. Sacred areas therefore must be preserved at all cost.

Planning is then seen as a long term activity with a time period

many generations. Characteristics which help to maintain place are beneficial. Time is sacrificed for understanding, sensitivity and consensus. A place is better protected, preserved and enhanced when everyone knows why.

Western societies place great emphasis on material growth, with a monetary system which indicates success. Economic growth is seen as necessary for the community to survive, even at the expense of the environment, family or individual, "The man with the most toys wins!" seems to be the ideal of the Western society.

Little importance is placed on human relationships because it doesn't add to the gross natiogal product. The very Earth becomes threatened in order to feed the consumption of the society for Community Service Bulletins

growth. The problem which is now being perceived is that the resources will limit the economic growth and a Western society will not survive unless there is a new way of thinking."

Our strange obsession with time has spawned the Type-A personality with the consequence of a high rate of heart disease. As our society fights to control time and control the natural environment, the further we move from being in tune with the planet. We must examine where we are going in such a rush. Type-A people can change and so I believe that society as an aggregate of those people can also change but first we must realize that our world view is leading to problems.
