## Staff instructional video

The Halton Board of Education has produced a video that informs staff of the economic challenges ahead, prepares them for the sacrifices to come and invites them to provide input in a collaborative way in order to reduce costs. Stresses Bob Williams, Director of Education, "Since the Premier's announcement, rumours have been running rampant within school systems about the impact of the provincial restraint on staff and schools. It was critical that we take fast action in providing much needed consistent information for staff in order to squelch the rumours and communicate the seriousness of the fiscal situation we face."

The video titled "Director's Report" is a first for the Halton Board of Education. It was com-


pletely produced internally and Williams emphasizes that "This was done on the cheap. Production costs for the 100 videos total \$20.00. The tapes that have been sent to schools will be returned to us for reuse. This kind of frugality reflects our approach to cost saving."

The 11 minute report clearly communicates to staff the severity of the impact of the recession on the school system. Williams notes that, "For the next three years or longer, we will be looking at much constrained resources."

Williams goes on to say in the video that it is clearly adminstration's plan that there will be no layoffs. He stresses, however, that, "Part of the sacrifice in order to achieve no layoffs, will be a change in salary expecta-

tions for staff", and goes on to ask staff to consider a 1 per cent increase similar to that recently accepted by the Ontario Public Service Employees' Union.

Highlighting that the adminstration's goal is to present for trustees' approval an expenditure budget with an increase around the inflation rate, Williams calls on staff to work together to help reduce costs. Willimas adds that, "We have a school system based on caring and co-operative relationships. In tough times these basic beliefs are tested, but I know that our staff will be willing to come together to suggest ways to save money." The Director encouraged staff to send suggestions to him on ways to cut costs, either signed or anonymously.
