A focus on quality client care and staff support convinced Acton's Deborah Mc-Dowell that Premier Homecare Services (PHS) was the only company she wanted to represent when starting a new in-home care business.

While she is happy to leave the more "boring" aspects of setting up a new business – like paperwork and setting up software – to her husband, she is busy hiring caregivers and introducing herself to the community.

"The caregivers are the heroes in making sure our clients have a better quality of life. I've hired eight so far, and will hire more as I staff-up and we get active in Brampton and Milton," McDowell said, adding the personal touch makes a big difference in quality of care. "Our care workers will build really strong relationships with our clients. Many of the caregivers I've interviewed said working in some long-term care facilities is emotionally draining – like working on an assembly line. Our service will be more humane," McDowell said.

Premier's commitment to the personal touch appeals to McDowell who will meet and get to know each client and caregiver to ensure a good fit. If clients have a question or concern, McDowell said they would call her directly, not an impersonal call centre.

PHS caregivers are bonded and insured and extensive reference and criminal background checks are required. They are committed to helping people stay in their own homes, with appropriate care and companionship.

"We can help clients remain independent, healthy and active," McDowell said, adding studies show the onslaught and degree of Alzheimer's can be lessened by keeping someone active and engaged. She is a firm believer in prevention.

"Pretty much 40 per cent of the people in long-term care are there because of a fall – we can prevent falls with proper training and I encourage caregivers to become exercise buddies with their clients, going for walks and doing simple exercises," McDowell said.

PHS specializes in Alzheimer's and dementia care, and will design a care program as individual as each client. From personal care assistance, errand running, meal planning to light housekeeping, companionship and palliative care, PHS offers a wide range of programs with flexible scheduling – everything from by the hour to live-in.

McDowell said she received a warm welcome during her recent visits to Acton area health care practitioners and once settled in Acton, will look at the Brampton and Milton markets.

Along with Acton's Royal Bank of Canada, McDowell is co-hosting a seniors' event at the Sobeys plaza on January 20. Seniors will be issued a passport at the bank and invited to visit shops and services in the plaza that will offer merchandize, coupons and information in a gift bag. McDowell will focus on fall prevention during the event.
