Any school board trustee reluctant to continue sharing the cost of bussing Rockwood south students to Centennial Public School should be made to walk the dangerous route.

Guelph/Eramosa Councillor Doug Breen made the comment last Monday as Council approved contributing its share for this year, \$15,000, to bus the students, who otherwise would walk along Highway 7, where there are limited proper sidewalks.

Three years ago, Council petitioned the Upper Grand District School Board for the bus service after the Board restricted bus eligibility, that it offers as a courtesy, not a right, to urban Kindergarten

Hillside cash

Guelph/Eramosa Township will contribute \$2,000 in inkind services to support the Hillside Community Festival, which will stage the 28th festival on July 22 to 24 at Guelph Lake Conservation Area.

Festival officials apologized for the last-minute request for Township help, but said it would lead to a collaborative grant to extend the festival to include a new Thursday night performance

Mayor Chris White noted the event is in the Township, and they should be proud. "We need to start connecting with it and branding with it..."White said, like they do with the Rockwood Parade of Lights and Eden Mills Writers' Festival.

The Township's in-kind contribution includes advertising space in the summer news letter, allowing linking opportunities through the Township website, and providing meeting space at Township buildings.

passes reasonable budget The "average" Guelph/ Eramosa resident will pay \$38 more in Township prop-

erty taxes this year – a total of \$829 – or just over 10 cents a day for services like recreation and parks, public works, planning and fire protection.

Township Council approved a \$4.3-million operating and capital budget on Monday. When County Council sets its tax rate later this month, the combined County/Township and Education property tax changes will result in a 2.8 per cent tax increase for the owner of a Guelph/Eramosa residential property assessed at \$335,000. That's \$106 more than last year, for a total tax bill of \$3,898.

At a statutory public budget meeting last Monday, Linda Cheyne, the Township's Manager of Finance said the budgets allow the said new challenges include

"We want to expand our economic viability, although, you know, we have limited funds to do so...we want to pursue funding opportunities," Cheyne said, adding they've been very fortunate to get government funding in the past years to help build roads and bridg-

Cheyne said the Township debt levels is good, and within three or four years, it will pay off all its taxpayersupported debt – a "pretty good position to be in,' according to Mayor Chris White.

The Township faces an 'extraordinary increase" in insurance costs, with premiums up 18.5 per cent to \$316,000 – almost double just four years ago. Cheyne costs to comply with mandatory regulation changes – one that forced the Township to unexpectedly buy a \$25,000 UV system at the Rockwood splash pad.

In a press release issued after the budget was approved, Mayor Chris White said faced with significant increases in insurance and inflation costs, it is a responsible budget with a tax increase less than inflation.

"This budget allows us to pursue funding opportunities and support a prosperous, healthy and growing community for future years," White said.

For every Township tax dollar collected, 56 cents is spent on roads and transportation, 21 cents on fire and emergency services, 17 cents on parks and recreation, seven cents on general government and three cents on planning.
