GDHS debate team wins Halton title

On Friday, Feb. 19, six members from Georgetown District High School's debate team travelled to Abbey Park High School in Oakville to compete against eight other schools from across Halton region. The resolution being debated at this year's regional finals was "This house believes that the current educational system is failing our students".

After the final round of this competitive tournament, several

debaters from GDHS came away with either individual or team medals.

In the individual speaker category, Chelsea Jackson placed sixth, Kylie de Chastelain placed third and Holly Kallmeyer placed second overall out of a total of 52 debaters. The added performances of both Erik Smith and Jack Britton provided GDHS with the total points needed to secure its first regional title since being formed in 2006.

In the team category, Dryden Bailey and Chelsea Jackson

earned a respectable fourth place finish while the team of Kylie de Chastelain and Holly Kallmeyer secured an impressive second place after being narrowly defeated by a team from Abbey Park. As a result of their efforts, both teams will go on to represent Halton at the upcoming Ontario provincial championships in Ottawa on March 25.

Needless to say, the GDHS team is looking forward to defending its crown as the returning Ontario provincial champions.

Transportation Master Plan to 2031 - *The Road to Change* PR-2414

Background

Halton Region is initiating a Transportation Master Plan – The Road to Change, to develop a sustainable, integrated transportation plan and associated strategies that consider all modes of travel (automobiles, transit, cycling, walking) to the year 2031.

Problem Statement

The Master Plan will provide the strategies, policies and tools required to meet the Region's transportation needs safely, effectively and cost efficiently.

The Process

This notice signals the commencement of the Transportation Master Plan, a study which will define existing problems/opportunities, consider and evaluate solutions, and identify an optimum transportation system to the year 2031. A key outcome of the study will be a list of transportation projects that the Region can incorporate in its 20-year Roads Capital Program. To comply with the Environmental Assessment Act, the study is being conducted in accordance with the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (EA) process (October 2000, as amended in 2007).

A key component of the study will be consultation with interested stakeholders including the public, interest groups and regulatory agencies. The study work plan provides for two rounds of Public Information Centres at four locations (one in each Local Municipality) and a Workshop. This notice advises the public of the first round of Public Information Centres.
