

Economy is not out of the woods yet

There's some positive news on the job front in Ontario.

The most recent Labour Force Survey released by Statistics Canada shows an increase of 18,000 full-time positions in Ontario during the month of May. That brings the total employment gains in the province to 127,000 since July 2009— an increase of 1.9 per cent compared to 1.8 per cent growth nationally.

Across Canada, the number of full-time positions was up 67,000 in the month, but was slightly offset by losses of 43,000 part-time jobs.

Gains were reported in transportation and warehousing (26,000), health care and social assistance (18,000), public administration (13,000) and agriculture (9,000).

But it wasn't all positive news from Statistics Canada.

Despite Ontario's job growth, the province's unemployment rate edged up slightly to 8.9 per cent as the number of people entering the job market and population figures rose.

Also, a study of laid off auto manufacturing employees at three Ontario plants shows only about one quarter are working and most of them earn a lot less since the economy began recovering last year.

The Canadian Auto Workers said Monday that preliminary results from tracking the experiences of 260 laid off members at Chrysler Canada in Brampton and two parts makers reveals almost half of them have also bounced from job to job and are struggling with social problems.

Even with modest EI reforms recently announced, it's clear that the recession will be felt for years to come by these workers.

What's more clear is the fact that the government cannot yet declare victory in the battle toward economic recovery.


