IMMEDIATE DENTURES

An "Immediate Denture" is a denture that is inserted immediately following the extraction of the natural teeth. Using the method, the denture actually acts as a sort of bandage to help the tissues heal. The denture must be left in place during the first 24 hours. You must follow normal post extraction recommendations, from your doctor and then come in for an adjustment/check-up appointment the following day. Another advantage, is that the patient gets their denture right away and doesn't have the inconvenience of embarrassment of having to go without teeth. Immediate dentures are very popular, however this route is not ideal for everyone. It often involves an extensive period of adjustment in which the patient and Denturist must work closely together for some time for best results.

If you have never worn dentures, your new teeth will probably feel strange and bulky in your mouth. This is because the muscles of your face, lip, cheeks and tongue are used to your former teeth, or to nothing at all. These muscles are being stretched and molded to new contours and dimensions. This muscle tension will subside in a short period of time. Also, learning to chew properly with new dentures may take two to six weeks.

It is also important that the person who extracts your teeth, does not have to be the person who makes your denture. Denturists are "Denture Specialists" who work together with other dental professionals, to make sure you get the best denture care available. You do not need a referral; simply call our office direct.

All current members of council have filed their nomination papers to seek re-election in October. McDuff is the first non-incumbent to file.

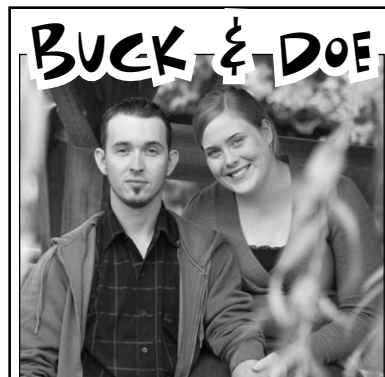
The last day to file nomination papers is Sept. 10.

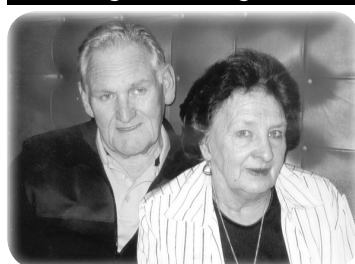

COUNSELLING THE NEW HEARING AID USER

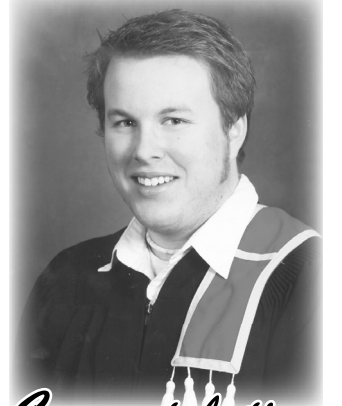
The following few tips, if followed correctly, will prolong the benefits and enjoyment of better hearing:
