MUST HAVE BEEN GROWN BY THE EXHIBITOR

"HINTS" - No more no less than the number of stalks, blooms etc. as specified; a bud showing colour is classed as a bloom; wedging is permitted; containers must be stable & not easily tipped.

10. Asters, 3 blooms, double variety
11. Heliospes, 3 blooms
12. Nasturtiums, 5 blooms with foliage
13. Coneflower, 5 blooms, any colour
14. Cosmos, 4 sprays, any colour
15. Dahlia, 1 bloom, any colour, under 6"
16. Dahlia, 1 bloom, any colour, over 6"
17. Rudbeckia, 5 blooms
18. Gaillardia, 5 blooms
19. Geraniums, 3 blooms with own foliage, any colour
20. Gladiolus, 1 stalk, any variety and colour
21. Gladioli, 3 stalks, any variety and colour
22. Gladioli, 5 stalks, any variety and colour
23. Marigold, 5 blooms, African (large), any colour
24. Marigold, 5 blooms, French (small), any colour
25. Mums, 5 blooms, any colour/variety
26. Pansies, 5 blooms, with own foliage
27. Petunias, 5 sprays, plain variety, any colour
28. Rose, 1 bloom, any colour, with own foliage
