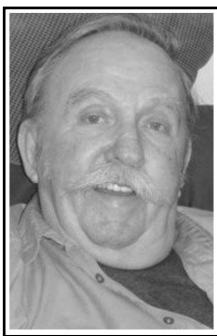

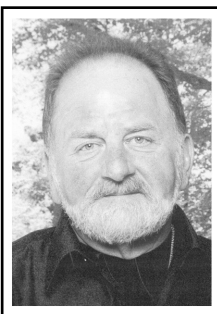

Wastewise recently celebrated its 20th Anniversary during a special day at Willow Park Ecology Centre.

Wastewise's goals are to divert resources from disposal and to educate individuals and businesses about waste reduction. At its 36 Armstrong location it operates a drop-off, and resale of, reusable items such as household goods, office furniture and clothing, recycles paper and other items. There is a user fee of \$1 for drop-off of recyclable items.

Note: Wastewise does not accept large appliances such as stoves, washers or dryers or mattresses and box springs.

Volunteers are always welcome. Wastewise hours are Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Thursday, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.
