

Online survey covers four areas

Residents asked to give input on town's blueprint for future

The Town of Halton Hills is in the midst of a project—the Community Sustainability Strategy—which will create the blueprint for this community's future, and now it wants public input on its work to date.

Residents are being asked to complete four online eight-question surveys before the end of November on the four cornerstones of the strategy: Social Well-being, Environmental Health, Economic Prosperity, and Cultural Vibrancy.

"The Community Sustainability Strategy is a very unique and exciting project. It is taking a long-term view to imagine a more sustainable future for Halton Hills and to develop a blueprint for how we can get there," said Mayor Rick Bonnette. "Our residents' input is key to making this a Strategy that is truly based on community input."

"I invite all residents to help shape the future of Halton Hills by completing the brief surveys," he said.

Public feedback is wanted to confirm or improve the four draft visions:

- **Social Wellbeing** is about quality of life, providing residents and businesses with the infrastructure needed for everyday living such as libraries, parks, hospitals, housing and alternative transportation options. The proposed vision for the social wellbeing of Halton Hills is: "A healthy and safe community which promotes an ethic of caring and inclusiveness."

- **Environmental Health** is about having access to, and enjoying, a natural environment that is healthy and diverse. It is also about promoting walking, biking and other active transportation options. A community that is environmentally sustainable includes initiatives such as intensification and water and resource conservation.

The proposed vision for the environmental health of Halton Hills is: "A community where residents are actively engaged in shaping the quality of community life for the present and the future; and where there is a thriving natural system in an around built-up areas which

is being actively preserved, improved, enhanced and protected for long-term health and enjoyment."

- **Economic Prosperity** requires a strong and diverse economy with low unemployment, a balanced tax assessment ratio between residential and non-residential uses, 'green-minded' businesses, flexible regulations to accommodate a variety of businesses and competitive business costs.

The proposed vision for the economic prosperity of Halton Hills is in

from local agricultural lands, food processing, and food industry research and development; an active cultural industry cluster; dynamic eco-tourism, agritourism, cultural tourism and sport tourism; and the maximization of live-work opportunities.


The 21st Annual Scout/Guide Food Drive held Saturday November 5th was a great success!
