

# Rangers' Sterk likes life in the middle

Josh Sterk bounces a puck off his hockey stick as he skates toward the goal during practice.

The 16-year-old Kitchener Rangers' rookie smiles as the black disc dances along the blade before letting it fall to the ground and firing it in the goal at the Aud.

There's something different about the Georgetown native of late. He seems like a new person ever since he was moved off the wing to his natural position at centre three games back.

"I feel much more fluid," he said. "I feel like a different player."

The Rangers are undefeated in the trio of games with Sterk centring the third line between Brandon Francisco and Zach Lorentz. He's scored a goal and added an assist and is plus-two over that span. By contrast, Sterk had just two points over his opening 13 games as a winger.

"You can see that he's a much better centre than a wing," said Kitchener head coach and general manager Steve Spott, who selected Sterk in the fifth round of this year's Ontario Hockey League draft.

"We feel he has the talent to become a lead centreman and a very gifted player in this league."

But it's small steps with the rookies. Sterk is get-

ting the Jeff Skinner treatment. The former Rangers' star, now with the Carolina Hurricanes, followed a similar path when he joined Kitchener.

"We started Skinner on left wing to allow him to become more comfortable in the league, take some responsibility away from him and then moved him to the middle," said Spott.

Sterk was eying scholarship rides to Bemidji State and Penn State before being selected by the Rangers. Changing course was easy for the Steve Yzerman fan.

"It was a no-brainer for me," he said. "It is such a great organization."

Adjusting to the league has been challenging.

"The first couple games were tough," said Sterk, who starting playing hockey when he was four years old. "The speed and strength were a lot different. Now I have a feel for it. I'm having more fun."

But more change may be coming. Such is life in the OHL.

Concussed captain Michael Catenacci is on the mend and inching closer to a return. He'll reclaim his spot as the team's top centre and that will create a bumping effect.

Sterk may have to haul back to wing. But that's just fine for the son of a truck company owner. The 5-foot-10, 150-pounder is just happy to be here.

"I just want to play," he said.

A biology major, McCabe will lead the Orange into this weekend's Big East tournament at Marquette University in Milwaukee as the fourth seed.

Meanwhile, freshman midfielder Justine Rodrigues was chosen for the NCAA Division II Daktronics All-Atlantic Region second team in women's soccer after scoring five goals and adding five assists for Gannon University this fall.




